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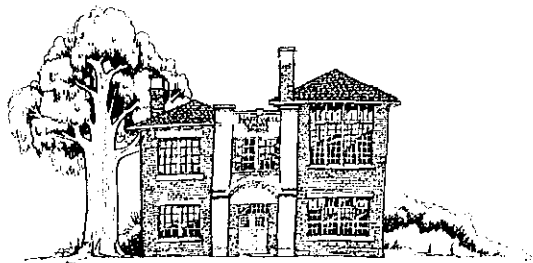

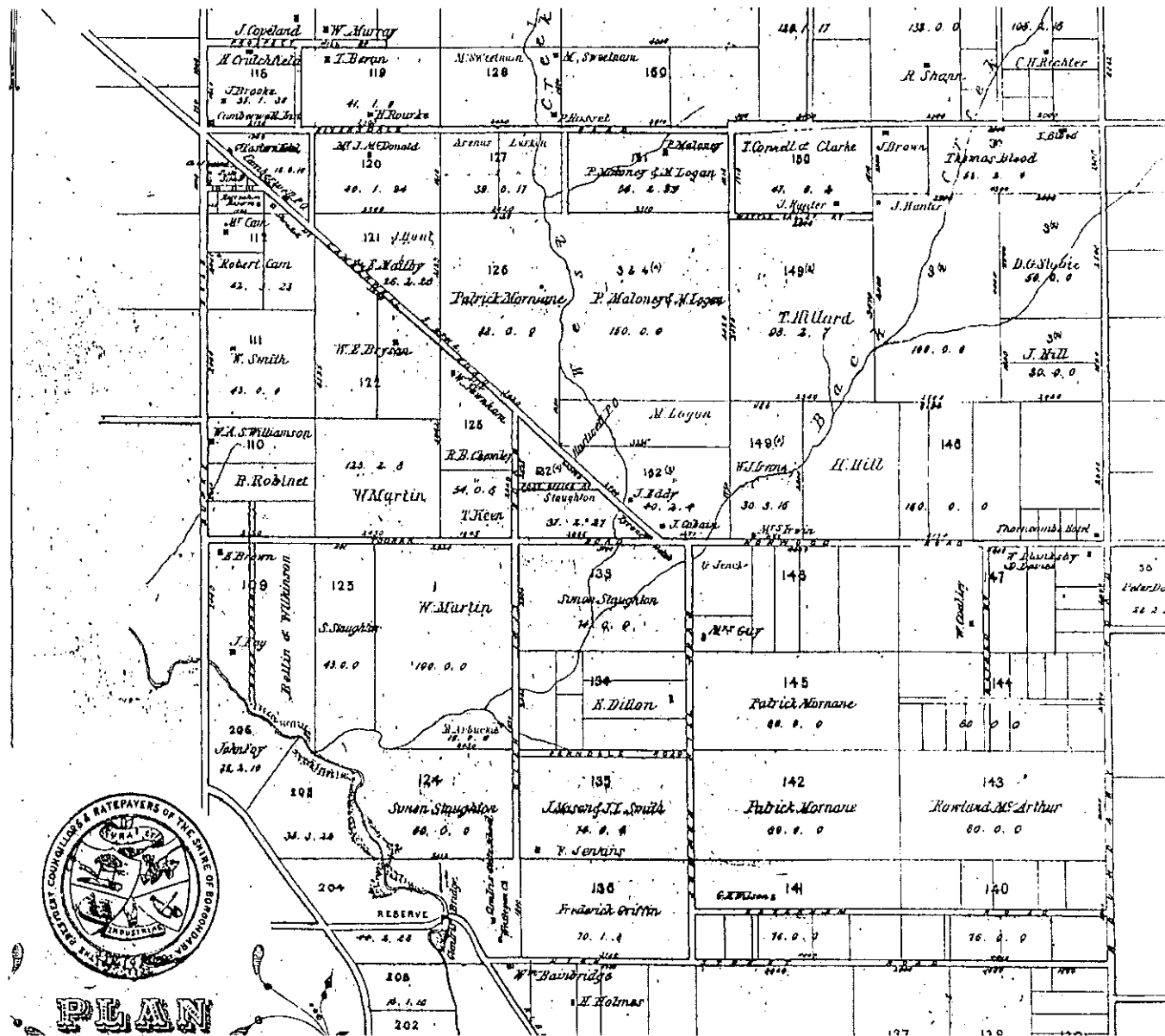

## 1. The Village of Hartwell

The Wurundjeri tribe of Aboriginal people were the first inhabitants of the area now known as Boroondara, the surveyor Hoddle having named the area after an aboriginal word meaning 'shady place'. In 1835, when the town of Melbourne was founded, Boroondara was bushland: a place where gum trees grew on undulating hills, and creeks wound their way to the Yarra River.

By February 1838 there were four homesteads east of the Yarra, including John Gardiner's sheep and cattle station where Scotch College now stands. Punts were established at Hawthorn and Kew to carry people, carts, and stock across the river.

In December 1841 John and Naomi Hill from Somerset, England, arrived in Melbourne. With them were their five sons, John, Rowland, Edward, Henry, and William. John Hill and his family took the punt across the Yarra and paid an annual fee to the government to become squatters on the east side of West Creek. The estimated location was near the corner of the present Fordham Avenue and Elaroo Avenue, Camberwell. Of course, there were no roads then, only rough tracks through the bush. It could take a full day to travel to Melbourne with a loaded dray.

When land became available for sale in the district in 1854, John Hill purchased 160 acres for £1 an acre. This land was known as portion 148 of the parish of Boroondara, and extended from East Boundary (Warrigal) Road in the east, to

Norwood (Toorak) Road on the south, to a line running through the present Stornoway Road and French Street on the north, to a line halfway between the present Highfield Road and Glencairn Avenue on the west. Thus the Hill family were the first owners of the land that Hartwell Primary School stands on. It is probable that theirs were the first white children to play under the giant gum tree growing in the school yard today. Until the beginning of 1997, the Hill homestead stood behind another house two doors up from Oberwyl Road in Toorak Road.

The tradition of market gardening the Hills began on their land continued for many years. They acquired more land in the area, and also near Lilydale. They built the Thorncombe Hotel which stood on the corner of East Boundary and Norwood Roads, and left a legacy of Somerset names in the district, namely Oberwyl Road, Ycovil Road, Milverton Street, and Merton Street. As well, the Hill sons named streets after their own offspring: Jesse Street, Charles Street, and Alfred Road. The Pollard family who currently attend Hartwell Primary School are descendants of this pioneering family.

In the early years after their arrival, the Hills would have had few neighbours. Geoffrey Blainey in his 'History of Camberwell' estimates that there were fewer than one hundred people living in the Boroondara area in 1850. In the 1850's Melbourne's population grew from 23,000 to 126,000 as people were lured by the goldrush. In 1851 a wooden bridge

Mr George Eastaway built a corrugated iron hotel at a junction of three roads, and named it 'Camberwell Inn' after Camberwell Green where he had lived in London, hence the name of the suburb. From this junction, Riversdale Road travelled to the east, and Camberwell (originally Ballyshannassy) Road to the south-east to the village of Hartwell. Hartwell, in turn, had taken its name from the 'Hartwell House' hotel built by James Irwin in 1853. Norwood (Toorak) Road was a bush track dotted with trees which continued on to the east to the village of Norwood (at the corner of East Boundary now Warrigal) Road, and then on to

was built over the Yarra River at Hawthorn, and a Dr. James Palmer built a mansion named 'Burwood' which gave its name to the main road travelling east. As the price of inner-suburban lands rose, more settlers moved east, and in 1853 unfenced scrub land on the eastern side of Burke Road sold for up to £40 an

Ballyshannassy (Burwood).

Boroondara east of Burke Road became a haven for the small farmer. In the 1860's a third of the land was tilled for crops, and the remainder was pasture for horses, cows, sheep, goats, and pigs.

West Creek and Back Creek flowed through the Hartwell area, to join up and

flow into Gardiners Creek at Glen Iris. These creeks, which flooded after heavy rain, kept roadworkers busy. The building of a bridge at Hartwell was Item One on the first contract let by the Boroondara District Road Board (forerunner of the Camberwell City Council) shortly after its formation in 1856. And in 1862 Mr G.H. Smith, a Hartwell storekeeper, petitioned for a bridge in Norwood Road because the creek on the road prevented residents from visiting his store.

1862 was an auspicious year for Hartwell, for in that year a 'finger-post' (a signpost with an arm terminating in the shape of an index finger) was erected there. A Post Office was established at Hartwell in the early 1860's, a small building

which stood near the present Smith Street in Camberwell Road. The Tyrone Hotel, which stood at the corner of Camberwell and Norwood Roads where Julianos's restaurant now stands, was also built in the 1860's and became a landmark in the area, to the extent that the corner was known as the 'Tyrone' long after the hotel had gone.

In 1887 the 'Age' newspaper described the Hartwell area in a walk from Malvern to Camberwell:

*'The Tyrone Castle Hotel, near Gardiners Creek in Hartwell is a favourite halting place for cyclists. A goodly number of bikes lean against the wall. There are acres of orchards with blossoms flying in the wind, and oceans of hyacinths showing through a hedge on Camberwell Road near the Hotel.'*

The Railway came to Hartwell in May 1890 with the opening of the Outer Circle line between Camberwell and Waverley Road Junction, from there to Oakleigh on the Gippsland line. There were 13 trains daily with 6 on Sunday, the stations being: Camberwell, Riversdale, Hartwell, Norwood, Waverley Road, and Oakleigh. Norwood became Ashburton in December 1890. Hartwell station became Burwood in 1909, and the Hartwell Hill station, built in 1905, became Hartwell. Golf Links station, opened in October 1909, was changed to Willison in July 1936.

The severe depression of the 1890's resulted in the closure of the Outer Circle line between Camberwell and Oakleigh in 1895. During the closure a privately owned horse

and cab service operated from Camberwell to Burwood via Burke, Camberwell, and Norwood Roads. The railway reopened in July 1898, but was nearly closed again several times due to low revenue. The line was electrified in 1924, and extended to Alamein in 1948.

Electric trams started running to Burwood in 1916, a further threat to the struggling railway line before Hartwell became more densely settled. The area was subdivided into housing lots in 1916, but it was only after World War I that soldier settlement homes were erected and population started to seriously increase.

The Burwood Mechanics Institute (opened in 1911) offered entertainments including dances, and was the main place to go for a 'good time'. Then on Saturday 8th May 1937 the Regal Theatre opened at Hartwell. It was built on the site of the former Tyrone Hotel, and had a furnished entrance and auditorium, circular foyer, roof garden, and a soundproof nursery where mothers with crying babies could continue to watch the movie without disturbing others. Its grandeur was short-lived, however, for it was demolished in its turn after drive-in cinemas became popular in the 1950's.

Hartwell is no longer a country village, a place of market gardens, nurseries, dairies, and paddocks. Not a suburb either, it straddles the edges of Camberwell and Burwood around busy Toorak Road. Today, its trees line streets or shade gardens and parks while its creeks run silently underground.

## 2. A Pioneer School

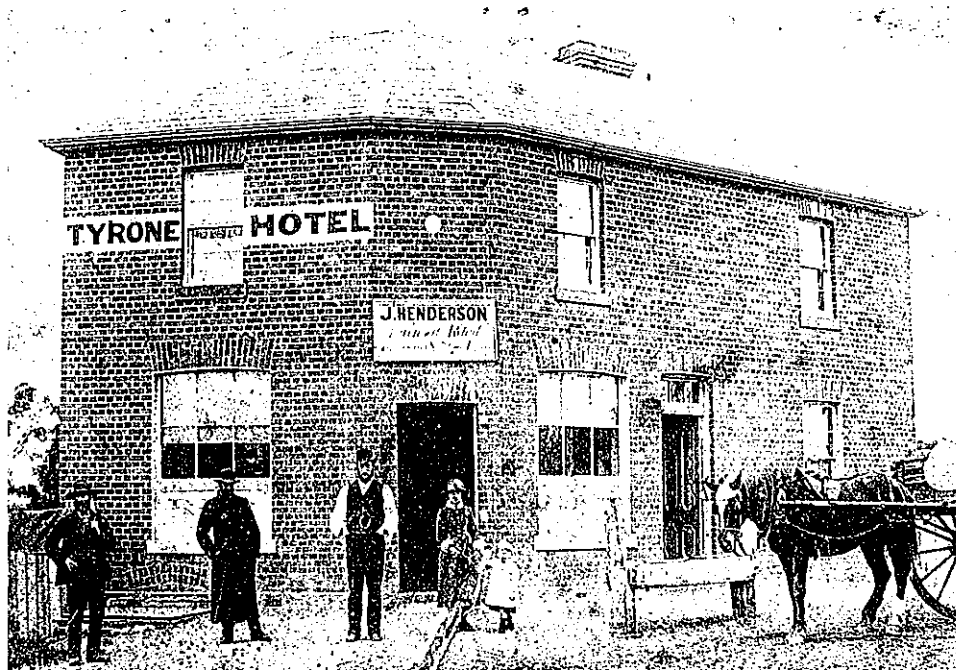
On November 15th, 1856, an Englishman, Richard I. Hurry, was appointed as teacher at the Ballyshannassy (Burwood) school which had been established by the Wesleyan church. His wife, Ann, assisted with the teaching, and they lived in a single-roomed house measuring 16 ft. by 9 ft. 8 ins. (4.9 x 3m. approximately) in the school grounds. In the 18 months that the Hurry family lived there, Richard Hurry lined the room,

erected a chimney, and added a new roof. However, when the local school board demanded that rent be paid for the house, Richard Hurry resigned and moved to Hartwell.

From 4th July, 1858, Mr Hurry conducted a school in the Independent Church building in Camberwell Road; the first school in the Camberwell area. Parents paid about one shilling and sixpence per week to send their children to school, and the

average number of students attending was 35. It must be remembered that education was not compulsory at this time, and only those parents who valued and could afford it would have sent their children to school. Children would have been required to help on their parents farms also, and at busy times may not have been spared.

Mr Hurry applied for government aid for his school in February 1859, and that year built a small schoolhouse of rough timber at a cost of £10 to himself. It became known as the Hartwell National School under the direction of the National Schools Board. Denominational or Church schools, in contrast, were controlled by the Denominational Schools Board. The school was guided by a board of local patrons, including Blanksby, the blacksmith, Eastaway, the Camberwell Inn keeper, Affleck, a farmer,

Kent, a merchant, and Thomas Richardson, a printing compositor. Unless they were given a lift by horse or dray, the children could face a walk of half an hour to reach school from farms or neighbouring villages.

When the government disbanded the rival National and Denominational Boards in 1862, the school became the Hartwell Common School under the new Board of Education. Richard Hurry remained as headmaster at a salary of £100 with £30 for his wife as sewing mistress, and £20 in lieu of a house. He also ran the local Post Office and sat on the Road Board.

Records reveal that Mr Gilbert W. Brown inspected the Hartwell Common School on December 8th, 1863. There he conducted reading, writing, and arithmetic tests with the students. Of the forty-one pupils on the roll, thirty-one were present on the day. Those listed on the inspector's roll were:

The names of some of the area's present streets may be recognized amongst the names of these children of Hartwell's pioneers, that is, Hunter Road, Dillon Grove, and Eddy Street.

But these children were to lose their school. In 1867 the 'grant in aid' was withdrawn from the Hartwell School by the Board of Education. It was transferred to the proposed new school no. 888 at Camberwell. As Mr Hurry could not afford to keep running the school on pupils' fees alone, it closed on 31st October, 1867. Protests made by the school Correspondent, Robert Kent, were in vain, and the Board of Education also refused to refund Richard Hurry the £10 he had spent in building his school.

Mr Hurry, then 50 years of age, opened a wine shop. The students transferred to Burwood or the new Camberwell school, and there was no primary school in Hartwell for another 54 years.

### 3. The Birth of State School No. 4055

An old Camberwell Council minute book records that in February 1919 Hartwell residents approached the Education Department with an urgent request for the provision of a new school. However, it was not until 8th November, 1921 that the school opened in a leased hall in Station Road (Trent Street) near Burwood Station. Mr Thomas Begley had been appointed temporary Head Teacher from 1st July 1921, but was transferred when the school opened. The first Head Teacher was Mr Alfred W. Jamieson, who was appointed from the 7th November, 1921. Six children were enrolled on the first day.

Mr Jamieson came from school no. 1002 at Sunbury, where he had taught for 12 years. Before that he was at Kyabram South. An extract from the 'Argus' newspaper of 27.12.1901 talks glowingly of Mr Jamieson's planting of eucalyptus trees in the Kyabram South school grounds as setting an example to the farming community. The article also mentions the fine flower garden created and maintained by the students.

The school inspector's report of the Sunbury school on 4.10.1916 has this to say of Mr Jamieson:

*'A very good teacher. His organization is painstaking and comprehensive. He teaches with a good degree of vigour and with skill. Children make generally good progress. There is a good tone in his school. Premises kept in very good order.'*

Unfortunately, Mr Jamieson's time at Hartwell State School was not to be so happy.

School inspector Mr Burgess visited Hartwell on the 14th November, 1921, one week after the school had opened. In an explanatory letter to the Education Department, Mr Jamieson recounted what happened that day. He had arrived at

the school at 8.40am. to find that one of the students had mislaid the key, and he was not able to get into the school until 9.15am. The assistant teacher was absent, and a Junior Teacher had not yet been appointed, so that left Mr Jamieson as the only teacher. At this point, the inspector arrived, and two boys took advantage of the disordered situation by engaging in disruptive behaviour. The inspector wrote this comment of Mr Jamieson in his record book:

*'Was seen somewhat at a disadvantage, but he did not show resourcefulness and ability to deal with the situation. His management and teaching of the school this morning have been disappointing. He did not secure a good working spirit.'*

This unfavourable report and the strain of starting a new school took their toll on Mr Jamieson, and his health began to suffer.

The new school building in Milverton Street was completed the following year at a cost of £6,859-10-0d. It contained six classrooms, and the official opening was on 14th April, 1922. Mr Jamieson chose the school colours of henna (red) and pale blue when the students marched from Trent Street to their new school, the colours being inspired by the red brickwork against the blue sky on that sunny day. The motto he chose was 'Ever Ready', and the badge was a star around a circle containing an 'H'.

At this time the school was surrounded by paddocks. Ashes were supplied by Camberwell City Council and spread by

parents and local residents to form tracks. This sounds like the first working bee!

On 26th April, 1922, Inspector Burgess returned to the school and reported that Mr Jamieson's health had broken down. He concludes his report: *'The school is not in a good state.'*

Mr Jamieson was also frustrated in his efforts to plant the grounds of the school. The school committee felt it was their responsibility, but failed to take any action. Mr Jamieson then obtained quotes and plans, but illness prevented him from proceeding.

On 6th September, 1922, a Mr B. Hurrey of the Burwood Progress Association wrote to the Minister for Education to complain about the state of affairs at Hartwell School. Due to Mr Jamieson's continued absence and insufficient staff to teach the children, organization and discipline at the school were poor. Often children were sent home as there was no teacher for them, and parents were transferring their children to other schools.

Mr Jamieson was transferred to a Richmond school on 18th November 1922 as an assistant teacher, but his health never recovered and he died on 24th April 1924 at the age of 57 years. He was survived by his wife Annie and seven children. His grand-daughter, Lesley (Judy) Jamieson, later attended Hartwell as a student.

Mr Thomas McClure stepped in as Head Teacher of Hartwell State School until the arrival of Mr Clement Baker in 1923. Mr James Doney took over as Head Teacher in

September 1924. He remained for 10 years, giving much needed stability to the young school.

Miss Eleanor Foster commenced teaching at the school in 1925, as Assistant Class 4. She had been transferred from the small Mt. Evelyn State School where she had been Head Teacher since 1918. She was so loved at this school that both boys and girls cried when told that she was leaving, and a long list of names was drawn up asking her to remain. Miss Foster taught at Hartwell for 31 years until she finally retired, and she is remembered today with fondness and respect by many former students.

In 1928, four more classrooms were added to the western side of the school, as well as a teachers room and cloak room. Some children attended classes in the Church of Christ Hall while the extensions were being built. Total attendance at this time was 447 students.

In 1929, the caretaker's residence was erected on the western edge of the school ground opening on to Merton Street. A high wooden fence separated the girls' and boys' playgrounds, and it was a serious offence to be caught in the wrong yard.

#### 4. From a Leaky Roof to a Royal Flag

Mrs Nell Gosling (nee Stewart) is grand-daughter of Mr and Mrs John and Ann Eddy of Hartwell. She spent much of her childhood at the old Eddy estate in Hartwell, opposite the Tyrone Hotel, her parents having moved back there to care for her grandmother. This property remained intact until Collings Street was cut through it to provide access to Hartwell station in the early 1890's. The estate was not subdivided until after 1916.

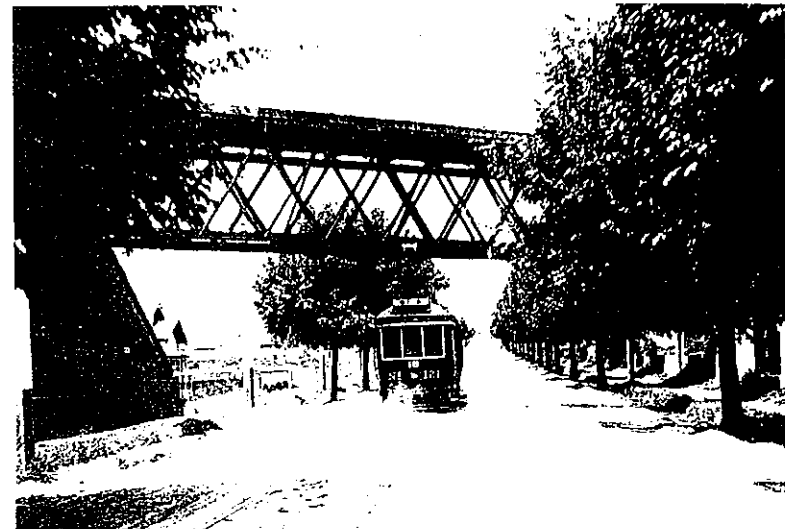
Mrs Gosling remembers the small footbridge over the creek at the bottom of Somerset Road, and a larger bridge on the other side of Camberwell Road. She also remembers the magnificent elms that grew in Norwood Road before they were cut down to make the road wider.

Nell Stewart was 11 when Hartwell State School opened in Trent Street, and she was transferred there from Camberwell State School. Mr George Holden was the Junior Teacher employed as assistant to Mr Jamieson. He was later to attend her wedding.

Joyce and Mabel Finch (now Mrs Joyce Strachan and Mrs Mabel Armstrong) also lived in Hartwell at that time. They had a house in Norwood Road near the railway bridge (where Armstrong's Panel Beaters now stands). They kept so many animals, including a horse, a cow, chooks and cats, that people referred to their place as 'Finch's menagerie'. Their father initially worked as a painter, and later had a lolly shop in Norwood Road. There were many vacant paddocks in the area,

and Joyce remembers a travelling preacher setting up his tent nearby. Another time, a tent was set up for 'Housey-housey' games (similar to Bingo), although children were strictly forbidden.

Joyce and Mabel used to travel to Camberwell State School on a horse drawn dray, until the Hartwell State School opened in Trent Street and they were able to walk to school. The wooden hall had a tin roof that leaked in heavy rain. Joyce thinks that it accommodated about 30 students, all ages in the one room.



*7. Norwood (Toorak) Road, Hartwell at the railway bridge 1920's*

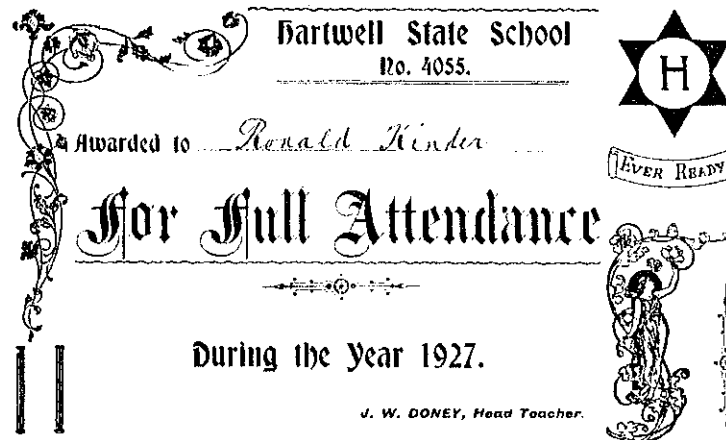


The children were excited to move into the grand new school building in Milverton Street the following year. Mrs Finch was a member of the Mothers' Club, and she donated the school's first flag. It was a Union Jack from the Prince of Wales' ship, the *Renown*. The Finchs knew Commodore Denton who had sailed on the ship, and he had given them the flag.

The school grew rapidly in size once it had moved into the new building, as students transferred from overcrowded neighbouring schools such as Burwood. Fellow students they remember are: May Morgan, Ron and Dave Kinder, Edna and Harold Groves, Ruby and Jean Phillipson, Beryl and Jack Guy, Jean Henry, Bruce Moss, Allan Powell, Rita and Mickey Mitchell, and Reg and Marjory Peck.

## 5. By Creek or Road - *Truda Drummond (nee Vear)*

When Hartwell School opened in 1922, my parents lived on the corner of Norwood (now Toorak) Road and Lithgow Street in a small house named 'The Bivvy', recalling my father's service in France in the First World War. As he was a builder, he probably watched with interest as the solid brick school took shape near to the Soldier Settlement homes he was helping to construct in the Highfield Road area.

In 1925 when I started school, Hartwell had a newly appointed Infant Mistress, Miss Lily Quittenton - my mother's sister. Each school day, Aunt Lil took the train from Golf Links railway siding to Hartwell station, walking up Kalang Avenue to Glencairn Avenue where we now lived at 'Shay Noo', the larger brick home Dad had completed in time for the birth of his first son.

After collecting her small niece, Lily either walked to school 'around the road' via Norwood Road, or 'across the creek' taking an exciting short-cut along the creek bank among the thickets of pink-blossomed quinces and across the cow paddock into Highfield Road. In Merton Street the back gate next to the school caretaker's cottage gave us access to the Boys' playground. With Auntie's hand to hold, there was no danger in walking among the groups of large boys kicking footies, spinning tops or playing alleys on the hard, clayey ground.

As Infant Mistress and First Assistant, Miss Quittenton was responsible for the training of the student teachers

appointed to the staff, as the bulk of teacher training was done 'on the job'. The standard text on primary education was written by an educationalist named Elijah, and Elijah was still the basic text when I was training in 1939.

Auntie Lil had collected folios of large coloured pictures which the student teachers used as teaching aids in preparing their classwork, and her personal library included early editions of May Gibbs' 'Gumnut Babies', and illustrated songbooks by Ida Rentoul Outhwaite. At the back of the 'Bubs' classroom with its folding glass doors was a good piano which Auntie played to accompany action songs and singing lessons, both for the training of teachers and for her own classes.

My memories of lunchtime were idyllic - after toasting crumpets on the open fire, I was free to do blackboard drawing, dipping into a new, full box of coloured chalks (provided there was a clean board when the school bell rang). I could also read stories, look at picture folios or tinkle on the piano - a rich introduction to the world of learning.

When there were tutorials at lunchtime, I was sent out to play with my classmates in the Girls' yard in the shade of an enormous red gum - a relic of the magnificent trees that once grew between Gardiner's and Back creeks in the Ashburton forest. My father had built a slatted bench around this ancient tree, and a forbidden joy was to run around this bench playing tiggy. Every so often an unwary foot slipped between the slats

and there were howls and tears while the culprit waited for a teacher to prise the foot loose, and then had to confess to the crime of running on the bench.

Dad was also responsible for erecting the school bell which was first placed near the school's front door then, when the new wing was added, moved out into the assembly area. First bell was clearly heard at Glencairn Avenue, and later gave my brothers and me time to reach school before the dreaded second bell rang, when all the pupils should be ready to fall into line.

Monday morning was always marked by the important

ritual of Saluting the Flag. When each grade was settled in line under the stern eye of the Headmaster, a whistle was blown and we all turned to face the flagpole. We then recited, hand on heart:

*'I salute the Flag, I honour the King,  
And cheerfully obey my parents, teachers, and the  
Law.'*

The whistle blew again for About Turn, the school drummer stood with drumsticks raised above the shiny kettle-drum, and on the whistle, struck up a rousing march as we all filed off to our classrooms. My brother's mate, Roger Royle, always ended with a flourishing drum roll: *'Who put the wrinkles in tripe? I said the butcher last night.'*

The mark of a well-run school was its attention to discipline, and Mr Doney, the Headmaster, set the standard which the rest of the staff were expected to implement in their classes. The Head Teacher had a mean reputation with the strap, and both girls and boys could face the line-up at 'The Office' if the misdemeanour warranted. Sometimes the girls were let off by reporting to Miss Quittenton instead, which could leave you pretty crestfallen after a lecture and a smack with a ruler.

Motherly Miss Hussey had Grade 3. Miss Foster taught Grade 4 and introduced us to part-singing of Three Blind Mice and London's Burning. Grade 5 was Miss North, whom I didn't know as I was

now spending alternate years in a tiny 10 pupil school in the Mallee. Dad had taken up a soldier settler block as the Great Depression killed the building trade, and being a country boy, he reckoned he could always feed his family if he had a bit of land.

So my next teacher was Miss Grey in Year 6, a year I lived with my aunts. Mr Sommerville took Grade 7, and my final year at Hartwell was under Mr Strawhorn, a returned serviceman in a brown tweed suit and wearing his rising sun badge. Mr Strawhorn introduced us to compound interest, algebra and logarithms; to parsing, analysis and compositions; but best of all to drawing, albeit of the flower-pot and football, or pencil-case with ink-well style. We used pencil or real coloured pastels. I was always pipped for top by Gilbert Docking who, however, was to make his mark in the world of Art as a Gallery Director.

One or two events of these years remain vivid memories. The school fair included a competition for best decorated truck or billy-cart, and my two brothers in school uniform with peaked cap and star badge decked their truck out in the henna and pale blue of the school colours. Bran dips, toffee apples and three-legged races were part of the fun of the day. A school cantata held in Camberwell Town Hall was a big occasion remembered for the final tableau where the fairy queen and her retinue were illuminated in a rosy glow when cans of fizzing chemicals were ignited in the stage wings, producing a gasp of surprise and delight from the audience.

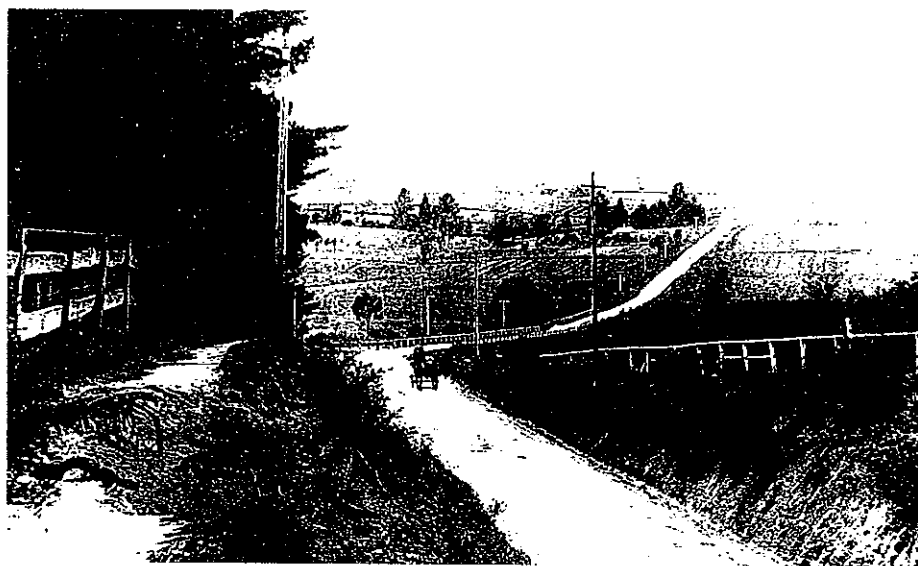
The death of Brigadier-General H.E. 'Pompey' Elliott made a deep impression. One of the most admired officers in the first AIF who had led his men in the Gallipoli campaign, the Battle of the Somme and the counter-attack at Villers-Bretonneaux, he died tragically by his own hand. As befits such a hero, he was buried with full military honours.

So it was that, after his funeral service, as the military cortege made its way towards Burwood Cemetery along Toorak Road, the children of Hartwell State School were bidden to line the roadside and stand in silence as the solemn parade passed. According to the tradition of the time the coffin, mounted on a gun-carriage drawn by squads of soldiers, was draped with the Australian flag and surmounted by the gold-braided peaked cap, the baton and the medals which denoted his rank and battle honours. Bringing a lump to many young throats, without our knowing why, the General's noble war-horse followed the gun-carriage, in shining harness but riderless and with empty riding boots mounted in reverse in the stirrups.

Many of the children of that day would scarcely have finished their secondary schooling in time to answer again the call to war.

## 6. A Good Day on Sixpence - Keith 'Pip' Patterson

I started school at the beginning of 1924, aged 4 1/2 years, crying my eyes out. The teacher asked if anyone lived near this boy and Bob Alway shot up his hand. Bob took me home to mother. Mum promptly turned me around and took me back to school. Enough said. I remember the desk was a very long one where about eight kids sat side by side. We had a white inkwell each, let into a hole in the front edge of the desk. Books and paraphernalia went under the desk top.

In those days boys wore short pants, boots with thick leather soles, and a large pullover which you grew into, not out of. When it was wet, the pullover became a sauna and slowed you down to a gallop. That first year was plain hell. My elder brother, Bill, was two years ahead of me and told me to stop blubbing and stop being a so and so sook. Eventually all settled down.

Fortunately the teachers were good, very good. Mr Doney, Headmaster, Miss Quittenton, Miss Foster, Mr Sommerville, Mr Strawhorn and Miss Button. Later came Miss Brown and Mr Clarke and wonderful Ma Grey, who would wear herself out strapping the boys but it didn't really hurt. The teachers at Hartwell Primary School were very strict, but fair, no

shenanigans. They commanded respect, and I am very glad to have known such people.

Miss Foster was a teacher who set a goal for you to attain. She had me draw things such as nature study, leaves and flowers around the school in pen drawings. Another thing she had me do was draw a circle on the blackboard with just one sweep of the chalk. It must have worked, I've been a commercial illustrator/artist ninety percent of my working life, 50 years plus. I always worked freelance, having combined mechanical engineering drawing and art to create such projects as cars, trucks, tractors, even rockets in finished 2-dimensional

colour drawings. This showed what the products would look like in their finished form, and they could be changed if necessary before costly tooling up began.

Those days Toorak Road was known as Norwood Road and was treelined up both sides. The horse tram operated up to the arrival of the electric tram, a narrow conveyance which cost, short trips, one penny. Burwood Terminus (Warrigal Rd.) to Camberwell Junction was 3 pence (3d.), Burwood to City (Melbourne) 6d.

Hartwell and Burwood had large paddocks and forests near the Hartwell Football Ground. Grass and trees ran right down to the railway cutting. This area was called Holloways Paddock and we went tadpoling and yabbing in a couple of waterholes. Houses were scattered all over the place, on roads not yet formed. A good block cost up to £100.

In Norwood Road on the rise near Alfred Road was

Aisbett's Aviary which housed peacocks and beautiful birds of many varieties. An old farm house, a sign of earlier times, abutted the cliff on the north side next to the aviary. Opposite Aisbett's Aviary there was Boyd's poppy farm and a strawberry farm. They frequently had poppy picking competitions to see who could pick the most bunches (one dozen per bunch) in a specified time. The aim was to get the flowers to market on time, similar with the strawberries.

At night in Beryl Street, amid the screeches of the peacocks, we could hear the market gardeners racing to market with fresh vegetables to sell. The next day we would see the gardeners returning slowly up Norwood Road, the drivers in their little canopies nodding asleep, the big draught horses heading for home in full control, knowing exactly where to go.

It was a great place to grow up in. You could have a really good day with only sixpence to spend.

Those years led to the Great Depression. Things were bad for men. Boys could find work; men couldn't. Chemists, engineers, and good tradesmen worked on projects like the Yarra Boulevard, clipping grass, digging trenches and other menial jobs. They were given a weekly handout called Sustenance, or 'Susso' for short. People walked out of their homes, took to the roads, or 'humped their bluey': a bed roll, a tea billy and their few belongings wrapped in the roll. They were looking for work, anywhere.

As the years went by, the dirt roads of the area became sealed. There was a single tram track up Norwood Road; then all the trees disappeared and it became Toorak Road. Hartwell

shopping centre developed where Toorak Road joins Camberwell Road. The site known as the 'Tyrone', where the old unlicensed pub stood, became the Regal theatre. Then there was Purke's grocer shop, where your order was delivered, always with a cone of boiled lollies for us kids. There was Morgan's bakery, the barber shop and billiard saloon, where possibly one could have a bet or discuss test cricket, both of which our Dad did to his enjoyment. Another business was Dwight's Painters and Decorators. All the Dwight kids attended Hartwell school.

The area gradually built up and we lost our swimming hole down off Through Road. Paddocks became housebound, big houses, small houses, shops; and Hartwell State School built an extension to cope with the rise in population. More teachers came, including Mr Doney's son, Eddie.

A single tram line with loops gave way to double lines, better trams, everything in order, more cars, more jobs, more bills, a few bob in the bank. Then Adolf Hitler changed the world into a madhouse, and a lot of Hartwell boys and girls went in all directions. I think they had fond memories of Hartwell State School, as it was known then. Any one who attends there is very lucky.

Some former students I remember:

Bob Alway - my schoolmate was a P.O.W. of the Japanese in Malaya, Changi, etc., and only just survived to form and run a successful interstate trucking business, to die later of a heart attack.

Bill Patterson - my brother, engineer, died in a car accident in 1953.

Senator Ivor Greenwood - Federal Attorney General in the Fraser Government.

Albert Berisford - Dux of Hartwell, who after long war service was Colonel O.C. in charge of Balcombe Army Camp, post-war.

Fenton Argoon - another Dux, who after service in the RAAF worked in Federal Customs.

Trudi Vear - Miss Quittenton's niece, I met during the war while I was hitching back to my unit. She was a WAC transport driver. I was lucky, she said she didn't like hitch-hikers and never picked them up, but she was dying for a smoke.

Jim Delaney - I met in the sergeants mess about 1942, somewhere in Queensland.

Ron Strachan - won a chestful of medals in the Navy and was in the thick of the Coral Sea Battle.

Eddie Davy - used to play the drum as we marched into school.

Percy Howarth - didn't return from the war.

## 7. 1930's: Depression, Polio, and Flower Shows

Australia found itself in trouble in 1929, unable to sell its wool, wheat and metals overseas. There was no money to pay for building works, and the Government was heavily in debt to Britain. People stopped buying goods, and factories slowed production or closed. The Great Depression had arrived.

By 1932 about one in every three Australian workers was unemployed. Soup kitchens were set up by local councils and the Salvation Army, and the Government established a system they called Sustenance, which became known as 'Susso': unemployed people were given food and clothing in return for useful work. Those who did 'Susso' hated it - they felt they were being treated as inferior citizens. There were

beggars in the streets, and long queues formed every time a job was advertised.

Geoff Patterson (younger brother of Keith) remembers: *'there were lots of children who came to school without shoes or socks. In fact, a number of children did not have enough to eat for lunch, so if you had an apple they would ask you to keep them the apple core.'*

Others were more fortunate. Harold Trinick was one of a family of 9 children, up to 7 of whom could be at the school at one time. He recalls his mother and grandmother walking to school on very cold days with a great bucket of hot soup, which they would dish out to their children in the shelter shed, amid cat calls from the rest of the school.

People had to learn to cope with the hard times as best they could. They made their own clothes, furniture, and toys. They grew food in their backyards. They swapped and shared with neighbours. They organized their own amusements, and 'made do'. Peter Gratton remembers that Scouts were active in the hall near Burwood station, and many children were members of a Sunday School. Back Creek was open and forbidden as a playing place, therefore very popular.

In 1930 another two classrooms were erected at Hartwell State School to cope with rising numbers of children. The two wooden freestanding rooms, one from Camberwell S.S. and one from West Brunswick S.S., were

placed at the western end of the school building. They had fireplaces for heating in winter.

Many mothers were involved in the Mothers' Club which organized the Annual Flower Shows held in the 1930's. These gave parents and children the chance to be awarded certificates for home produce and craft work. The Mothers' Club also held dances in the large schoolrooms. At school, the children were divided into 'Red' or 'Blue' House for sporting competitions.

1937 was the year that the poliomyelitis epidemic struck, and some children at Hartwell contracted the disease. Worried parents kept their children at home for months hoping to avoid the illness. School life was disrupted in many ways, and there were no class photos taken that year. But polio was not the only disease that caused concern; scarlet fever and measles also took their toll.

In 1939 the school purchased a Kodascope projector for showing silent films. The Head Teacher had to request permission from the Education Department to show the school's first film, 'Vacuum Oil Company', showing the making of oil.

Many students who attended Hartwell State School in these years have recollections of Miss Foster. Victor Bruce remembers an altercation between a student and a male teacher taking place on the top floor balcony, which wasn't then closed in with windows. The large student tried to push the teacher

over the balcony, but Miss Foster rushed out of her classroom and managed to talk him out of it.

Eric Hancock remembers Miss Foster's diminutive size. He says:

*'She stood on the first floor balcony overlooking the quadrangle where the students were assembled and conducted with great gusto the singing of the National Anthem. The funny thing was that, because of her stature, all that was visible to the students were her energetic arm movements.'*

## 8. Threepence for the Red Wizard - *Frank Fell*

I started at Hartwell State School in 1934 in the 'Bubs', and finished eight years later in 1941 with my Merit Certificate. I lived in Highfield Road in the War Service Homes Estate, my parents having moved there in 1924. There was lots of open space around us: nurseries, dairy farms, and plenty of horses. Now it is all built on and the old homes are being replaced.

We all walked to school, meeting others and playing on the way. Most of the teachers also walked. Monday morning was always the big assembly. We would all face the flag as it was unfurled, then we would put our right hand over our hearts and recite the pledge. Miss Foster would get out the tuning fork and give us the note, then we sang 'God Save the King'. We marched into class to the drums, then out for playtime, into class, and home for lunch. Then back to school until it was time to go home for the day.

We would play footy in Lynden Park if we were lucky enough to have a friend who owned a footy. If not we made one out of paper tied very tight. We would kick the ball to ends, maybe a dozen kids each end. If the cricket season was in we did the same; a tin or pineapple case for a wicket, a lump of wood for a bat, and maybe twenty kids a side. We all made our own fun.

It was the time of the Depression and there weren't many bikes or scooters around but we made our own trucks (now called billy carts) out of pram wheels from the local tip

and a fruit box from the local greengrocer. They were deadly contraptions but we had a lot of fun in them.

The schoolground was hard clay with a bitumen path down to the boys' toilet. A paling fence divided the girls' and boys' playgrounds, and we daren't go into the girls' yard for fear of getting the cuts. We used to play cowboys and indians, cops and robbers, kick the tin, puss in the corner in the shelter sheds, spinning tops, marbles, saddle me nag - pretty rugged stuff. Those who could afford it had Dinky toy cars and they used to race them along the spoon drains around the edge of the schoolground. We also played hand cricket and of course the odd fight.

I don't remember a school uniform - some of the girls wore a tunic and blouse, but we just wore what we had. In Prep we first used blackboard and chalk, then graduated to slate and slate pencil. We learnt our tables and our alphabet thoroughly. There were monitors for various duties: ringing the bell, putting out the National Safety Council flags for the school crossings, cleaning teacher's blackboard.

We used to do 'physical jerks' (exercises) in the school yard. P.E. teachers would come from the Education Department weekly. We also played tunnel ball, and we had a Marching Squad that competed against other schools at the Glenferrie Oval.

Some of the classrooms, Grade 1-2 and 5-6, had big concertina doors which were used to enlarge the room for special occasions, like when the Red Wizard came with his Punch and Judy show, talking doll, and tricks. If your parents could afford threepence you could go to see it; if you didn't have threepence, then down to the shelter sheds or the pavilions until the show was over.

Teachers I remember were Miss Quittenton my first teacher, Miss Gardner, Mr Jeffries, Mr Moody, Mr Tanner, Mr Jenkins, Mr Wiseman, Mr Clarke, Mr Sommerville, Maurice Sheehan (a Richmond footballer - watch out if Richmond lost!), Miss Tasman, Miss Foley, and Miss Hurrey.

Headmasters of my time were Mr Doney, Mr Symes, Mr Smith, and Mr Tanner, Acting Headmaster. The school Inspector was Mr Green, and we dreaded his visits to the school. He would walk into the classroom, sit on the teacher's chair,

and fire questions at us pupils. While you were trying to think of an answer for him he would be grunting like a pig at you. We were always glad to see him go.

The Caretakers of the school were Mr and Mrs Randall. They lived in a house on the school property. We used to like watching Mr Randall stoke up the coke boiler used for heating the classrooms. He kept the boiler spotless. I think the caretakers were more respected than some of the teachers. Most of the teachers used the strap on the boys and a cane on the girls. Mr Moody was famous for his 'six of the best double-handers'.

A lady named Madam Bindley arrived at the school to teach us ballroom dancing. We were lined up on the quadrangle, boys one way, girls the other. We stopped, faced each other, and there was our partner. The piano was on the landing. The music started and we all became 'chickies' in Madam's language. She had us all waltzing and dragging our feet around the yard. A few weeks later a big ball was held in the Camberwell Town Hall.

The boys used to do wire work and basket work in the shelter shed. We made toasting forks and wire grillers; we made cane fruit baskets, tea trays, and even clothes baskets. Then in year 7 and 8 we went to the Sloyd Centre in Butler Street, Camberwell to do carpentry. It was great. As well, each grade used to spend time working in the school garden. We took great pride in it.

In 1937 the polio epidemic, or infantile paralysis as we knew it, closed part of the school. The classes affected had

pupils in them who had contracted the disease. We did our schoolwork by correspondence.

Everything changed in 1939; our fathers were off to the war again. A lot of us kids had socialized out of school because of our parents being involved with the R.S.L. and auxiliaries. It really banded us together. At school the boys started making camouflage nets and the girls knitted for the Comforts Fund, also newspaper was collected and taken to school for fundraising.

Early in 1940 English and Scottish evacuees arrived at our school, having been sent out to stay with relatives. It was quite a novelty to have them at school and they soon settled in. There were the Cunningham, MacDonald, and McGlaughlan families.

The Mothers' Club bought a film projector and they used to get films from the State Library: 'Our Gang', 'Felix the Cat', and films put out by the oil companies. They would charge threepence, the proceeds to go to the school library. If

you didn't have that threepence, then it was the same as Red Wizard time: down to the shelter sheds. This stopped when Mr Tanner pointed out to those concerned that times were hard, the war was on, some parents were away, and large families could not afford it.

The Mothers' Club and School Committee also organised the Annual Flower Show. There were competitions for decorated bikes, scooters, pets, home made toffees, cakes and flowers. We always looked forward to this event.

The school had a slide projector that was used in conjunction with the wireless. Each week we would pack into the double room; the wireless would be on, the projector would have a slide in it, and the screen would be up. Professor Browne on the A.B.C. would say 'hello' and away he would go talking about the slide, then he would say 'next', and so on. We learned quite a lot that way as we could see what he spoke about.

I played the side drum in the school Drum and Fife Band. I also sang in the school choir which won the Choral Contest three years in a row. Mr Bill Moody was the Choirmaster, Dr. Floyd was the Adjudicator. I think it was 1941 when they extended the school. The pupils affected went to the Trent Street Hall, which became known as 'Bonehead College', until the building was completed.

Each year the top student won a prize and was named the Dux of the school. Grade 7 and 8 were in the same room with the same teacher. When you got your Merit certificate it basically qualified you for any future academic courses.

## 9. Bread and Jam in Newspaper - *Eric Muntz*

I was a student at the school 1934-1939, also a parent of 4 children who attended 1956 through to 1977 approximately. I lived in Collings Street, which has not changed very much. Most houses (1920's) are still there. Some were built later in the 1930's. Water and Love Streets were not made till later. Water through to Tyrone Street ran alongside an open creek which was barrel-drained about 1950, and Fordham Gardens formed. I walked to school in the early years. Later I rode a scooter (very popular in the 30's).

The girls' playground was partly asphalt, the boys' ground a hard, gravelly surface, a disaster if one fell while playing. We played impromptu football with two lots of boys kicking to the other end, each boy trying to get the ball and so get a kick. For marbles we formed a series of tunnels under and around the roots of trees and so played 'Alleys', similar to mini-golf. Now retaining walls have been built and grading carried out. Later, when I was a Dad, a very good system of rostered maintenance was organized by Ken Clarke (late 60's onwards).

The brick toilets were freestanding separate blocks. Boys' toilets were located down towards the N.W. corner of the school ground, girls' toilets in their playground nearer the school. We had lunch and did some practical work in the shelter sheds located on the site of the present library and portables. Most brought sandwiches, cake and fruit for lunch. I can recall poor depression-time kids whose fathers were

unemployed bringing bread and jam wrapped in newspaper. Cocoa was made by the Mothers' Club and sold for a penny a cup - perhaps poor children were given it free. Also I remember small bottles of milk being available. Mrs Wallace from Fordham Avenue was a leading light in the Mothers' Club.

What we wore to school was very varied, but not for reasons of individuality as might apply today: necessity was the ruling factor. I remember wearing grey pants and shirt with tie and school jumper, school cap with badge, and black shoes (some boys wore boots). Poorer children wore canvas 'runners'.

School day organization was much the same as now. Monday morning saw general assembly in the quadrangle, the flag was flown and a pledge recited. We marched into school to a drum and fife band. We learnt times tables progressively from 2x to 12x. Great kudos attached to the ability to be first to recite each one. There was a school paper, but not just for Hartwell, and of course the school reader for each year as published by the Education Department.

Certain periods for basket and wire work were introduced. Wire work, taught by Mr Moody, was a bit unusual perhaps and not in general practice at other schools. Basket work classes were conducted by Mr Tanner (an apt name). A former Army Captain, he expected absolute discipline as if one were a cadet. No carpentry as I recall was done until I went to

Spring Road Central School, and even then we went to Armadale and Cremorne Street, Richmond for it.

For punishment, one had to write out mistakes 50 to 100 times, 'I must not talk in class'. The strap was fairly common, perhaps unfairly, for instance for talking during sessions of basket-work where talking was hardly a problem.

In the early grades we were awarded 'stars' (gold and silver) or animal stamps inked on good work pages. Prizes were awarded at Speech Night at the end of each year, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd being given for good exam results. The recipient's name was called out at the end of an evening's performance by students giving displays of baton-twirling, singing, recitations, etc. The Headmaster or another V.I.P. gave out the prizes.

Sports Days were held at the Hartwell Reserve in Bath Road. Mr Moody took on the choir and brought it to a standard whereby it won a shield 3 years in a row. I think the competition was held in the Melbourne Town Hall.

As the polio epidemic worsened, mothers unofficially took their children out of school. I was kept home amid jeers of 'cissy', but within days the school was closed.

I regularly meet up with two former mates: Gordon McFarlane, whose parents ran the fish and chip shop in Toorak Road near Trent Street, and Max Williams who started school on the same day as myself.

Apart from Mr Tanner and Mr Moody, I remember Miss Foster in 4th, 5th and 6th Grade. This dear old lady of the 'old school' type attended the 50th Anniversary Celebrations of Hartwell S.S., then in her 90's. The most famous old boy

was also there - Ivor Greenwood, later Senator. Teachers such as Mr Moody and Miss Foster, by their dedication and abilities, gave the best years of their lives to their profession.



## 10. Miss Foster's Magic - Jean Cole (nee Colledge)

My first year at Hartwell school was 1935. Miss Quittenton was head of the Infant School, a post that she held for many years afterwards. There was a headmaster by the name of Smith for at least some of the time, and a nice but very old school inspector named Mr Symes.

In 1936 a group of 12 of us moved up to Grade 3 with Miss Foster who also took a slightly larger group in Grade 4, both in the same classroom, and we moved with her and the other group to the end of Grade 6 when we all dispersed to other schools.

Miss Foster was old - I realised years later she was at that time already into her 50's which at that stage was even older than parents, and although we thought she was crabby at times, she was loved and respected because she was always fair. She gave us a good solid grounding in those things which still seem important to me - spelling, mental arithmetic, and observing things around us; people in the class gave morning talks or 'observations' (now I think known as 'Show and Tell'). It was Miss Foster who taught us the tonic solfa and took us for basket ball and games - she was a born teacher. She also had a sense of humour, kept a jar of barley sugar in her cupboard for special treats, and at the end of the year we used to play 'black magic'. We were encouraged to use the small school library, although as I was kept well supplied at home I suspect I did not use it very much.

Other teachers at the time were Mr Tanner who took Grade 6 boys, and to whom boys who misbehaved in other classes were sent to receive a dose of the strap, and Mr Moody who I think also taught boys' classes. However my happy memories of him were that he started the school choir, my first experience of choral singing which I still enjoy. I remember

hearing and learning 'Cherry Ripe' for the first time, and I still have to sing along when I hear it! We entered schools' choral competitions and I think we did quite well. At the end of at least one year there was a school concert in the Camberwell Town Hall (now the library) and I'm sure Miss Foster was involved in the organisation of it.

I remember having to line up for inoculations - I expect diphtheria for one - and lots of crying going on. There was also the great polio epidemic which crippled many, stopped us from going to the Baths, and some children were sent to school with white masks.

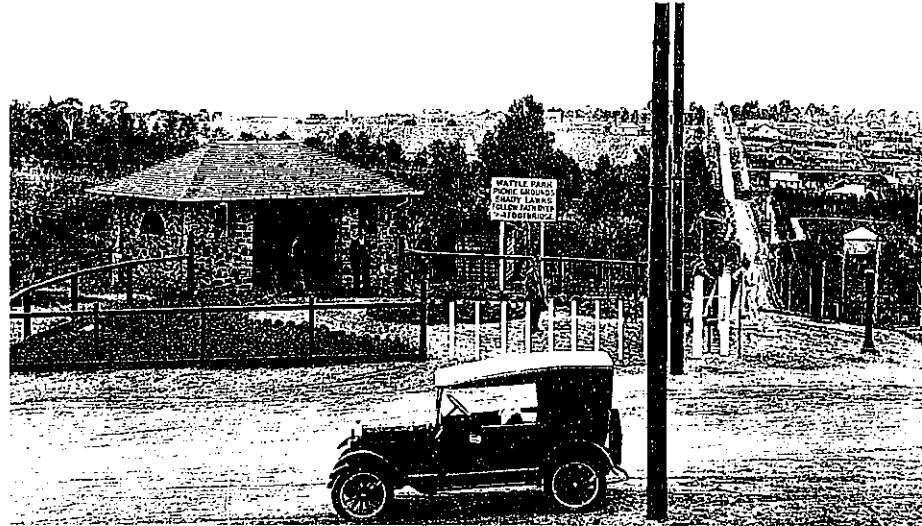
I also remember assembly each week and the saluting of the flag, with the life band playing for us to march inside, and the frightfully long two minutes silence for Anzac and Remembrance Days.

Each of the older classes had a garden bed down the Oberwyl Road side of the building which we tended under supervision. On Arbor Day we went for a tree planting in the now Lynden Park, although then it seemed to me it was just paddocks with a marvellous creek for yabbing and playing around generally.

In my Grade 5 year I did not attend school until late September because I was taken overseas, but Miss Foster - beyond the call of duty - provided lessons for my mother to supervise for the

year and I was able to go up to the next year without much difficulty. When our group of 12 finished at the end of 1939, Miss Foster took us to the Wattle Park Chalet for a grown up afternoon tea at her own expense.

I taught at the school for a few months in 1949 and was able to see Miss Foster from an adult viewpoint which confirmed all of my feelings about her. She was a very good teacher who was loved and respected, and a good person who gave her all to provide a firm foundation for further education and life in general.

## 11. 1940's: War Without and Within

When Britain declared war on Germany in 1939, Australia was quick to follow suit, and Australian soldiers were sent to fight in the Middle East and Greece. The Pacific War began in December 1941 when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbour. The war was suddenly a lot closer to Australia.

Australian soldiers in Singapore and Malaya were captured and put in prison camps, and in March 1942 the Japanese reached New Guinea. A few weeks before, on 19th February, Japanese planes bombed Darwin. In May, Japanese submarines approached Sydney.

The Americans used Australia as their base, and in May 1942 the American Navy inflicted the first defeat on the Japanese in the Battle of the Coral Sea. Other victories by American and Australian troops followed, but it was to take three more years of bitter fighting to end the war. It was only after the dropping of atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August 1945 that the Japanese surrendered. 32,000 Australians died in the Second World War.

At Hartwell State School in 1942 parents dug trenches in the playground, and air-raid drill commenced. Parents also requested gas masks and helmets, but the Education Department felt this was going too far. Money was collected from school families for War Relief, and children knitted socks for the troops. Food, clothing, and petrol was rationed, and air-raid wardens patrolled the streets at night. Ena Roach (Smith) remembers that the school made contact with Hartwell School

in England at this time and many of the children made pen-friends. Children collected soap, and mothers made fruit cakes, and these and other goodies were parcelled up and sent to the pen friends' families, especially at Christmas.

VP Day, the day the Pacific War ended, was a time to celebrate. Teachers told the children they could go home early, and Dawn Barr remembers that her brother took a piece of chalk from the classroom and wrote 'VP' on every square of the footpath as they walked home. The children were later given medals to commemorate the day.

During the 1940's the school population continued to

rise: in 1941 enrolment was 559 and new students were being turned away. The detached weatherboard classrooms were accommodating 50-60 students each, and the downstairs cloakroom was being used as a classroom. The Education Department rented the RSL Hall in Trent Street to accommodate some classes while two more brick classrooms were added to the west end of the school building. These were completed in 1942, and the cloakroom was converted back to its original function. In June of this year Mr Sprake requested that the upstairs balcony be enclosed as hundreds of swallows were roosting in the area at night. He complained that each day 'the walls, doors and floors are in a very bad state with their droppings'.

Overcrowding was again a problem in 1946, with net attendance in July at 667. There was a total of 293 children in the six junior grades (1 & 2), giving an average of 49 per grade. Fifteen of the youngest children applying for entry at this time were turned away due to insufficient space.

Electrical sound equipment was installed in the school in 1946. This included a bell call unit, external and classroom speakers, microphone and gramophone unit.

Children participated in sports with neighbouring schools. Johnny Walker remembers that the children were taken out onto Milverton Street and raced on the day before the inter-school athletics. Those who won the race for their age group participated in the sports the next day. Mr Hovenden coached the boys at football in Lynden Park, and Johnny was awarded a 'Best and Fairest' cup which he still has.

The school choir under the leadership of Mr Moody had success in choral competitions, winning the shield three years in a row and earning the right to keep it. Many students have happy memories of their time in the choir. Evelyn Robson (Douch) recalls that the folding doors between the Grade 5 and 6 rooms were opened for singing lessons. During one of these lessons, as Mr Moody was singing a prolonged note, his teeth fell out. The hundred or so children in the room collapsed with hysterical laughter, and the lesson was cut very short - doors shut and back to work!

In late 1942, a dispute arose between the Headmaster, Mr Edward Sprake, and the school committee, headed by a Mr Macgibbon. Mr Sprake decided not to hold a Speech Night that year as preparations would interfere too much with the classroom programs. Some parents were not happy at this decision.

When the time came for election of the School Committee (composed of parents and interested members of the community) in February 1943, the committee members of the year before rallied support and were re-elected, even though four of them no longer had children at the school. Mr Sprake was disturbed by their electioneering tactics and their obvious desire to oppose the way he conducted the school. He felt that their views did not have the support of the majority of parents, and he wrote to the Education Department asking that the nominations not be confirmed. He was supported by his First Assistant, Infant Mistress Miss E. Hurrey. She stated that these committee members had tyrannized staff for years, forcing

them to hold Spring and Autumn Shows, American Teas and Speech Nights, all of which greatly interfered with the children's schoolwork. Mr Sprake's action had merely brought the matter to a head.

The nominations were upheld, and a great deal of emotionally charged mail ensued over the following months between Mr Colledge (the Correspondent of the School Committee), the Education Department, Mr Sprake, and others.

Mr Curtis, a parent, wrote to the Director of Education to ask that action be taken to 'put a stop to the senseless and cruel persecution of the Headmaster Mr Sprake by the present school committee'. He felt that Mr Sprake's health was suffering. In May Mr Chapman, newly elected to the School Committee that year, wrote to the Education Department asking for help in resolving the deadlock between the Headmaster and the leaders of the School Committee. In September Mr Colledge wrote to complain that the Headmaster did not attend meetings or discuss issues with the Committee, and in so doing was treating the members shabbily. The Director of Education arranged a meeting with the warring parties, and wrote to Mr Sprake urging him to work in harmony with the Committee and forget past differences.

However the disputes apparently continued over the following years. In December 1948 reports were published in the 'Age' and the 'Argus' about the trouble at Hartwell School. A meeting of parents protested against the proposed transfer of Mr Sprake, and a vote of no-confidence in the School Committee was passed. In spite of this, Mr Sprake left.

Nita Fawcett (Parsons) who was a student from 1937-42 and a student teacher from 1948-9, remembers that Mr Wilson was the next Head Teacher. She says, 'He used to don jungle greens and work in the garden. Any visitors didn't realize he was the Head Teacher.' It seems that Mr Wilson's enthusiasm was rewarded. In 1949 the school was awarded the prize for the 'Best Australian Shrubbery' in the Inspector's District.

## 12. A Day in Grade 6, 1941 - *Jean Morley (nee Fowler)*

'Yes, I've cleaned my teeth and my shoes. Yes, I've got my lunch. Goodbye Mum.'

Out the gate, along Hartwell Hill Road, round the corner into Wattle Valley Road. It's downhill in the morning, but steep coming home in the afternoon, especially on hot days. Vacant land and long grass around the creek - I must never go there.

Round the Barber's shop on the corner and into Toorak Road. Past the little sweet shop with the bell that jangles when you open the door - sometimes I buy 'Conversation Lollies' in there, two for a penny. The Dispensary windows are all brown - nothing to see there. Kinder's woodyard has the big removalist van in the driveway - some people go to picnics in that. The shops on the other side of the road are more interesting, but I don't have to go over there to buy my School Paper until the beginning of next month.

Into Highfield Road and across Milverton Street when I'm level with the tall cypress trees at the back of the church. Here's the gate into the boys' playground, don't trip over or it'll be skinned knees on the gravel. Once past the end of the paling fence I'll be in the girls' playground and can walk on asphalt.

There's the bell, fall into line. Anyone late? They might get the strap. I don't want to get the strap again. I was only walking home with a friend when the teacher drove past and heard us calling out, listening for echoes in someone's

garage with its door open onto the street. I was called out the next day at assembly and got the cuts around the legs. More trouble at home then because of the tell-tale bruises on my legs. Boys are always getting the strap but they get it on the hands.

'Attention! Quick march!'

The side drums, the bass drum and the fife band play. Babies' grades to the left, round to the front door. Two classes to the right to their classrooms. All the rest in order up the central stairs, some to the left, our class to the right, and up the stairs to the cloakroom, where I hang my hat and coat on my peg. Up more stairs to the classroom.

'Good morning, girls and boys.'

'Good morning, Miss Foster.'

Mental arithmetic first, then roll call. No swimming today. We catch the train from Burwood station and walk through the park to the Camberwell Baths. I didn't go swimming last year because I was in hospital with scarlet fever. When I came home the Health Officer from the Council came around to check that I was still isolated. All the plates, knives, forks, and things I used had to be kept separately. All my clothes, slippers, books, writing paper and pencils I had in hospital had to be left there to be burnt. Nothing could be brought home.

Spelling now. I learnt today's list from the School Paper last night. There are some good stories in the School Paper, and sometimes songs which we learn at school with Miss

Foster. Now arithmetic and tables. Pounds, shillings and pence; furlongs and miles; bushels and hundredweights; roods, poles and perches - they're all printed on the back of my exercise books.

All the teachers seem so old, except for the student teachers, Miss Braddock and Miss Mason. Sam McLaughlin used to be cheeky to Miss Mason, he's always getting into trouble. He came from Scotland, there are some girls in Grade 7 and 8 from Scotland too. They're evacuees, sent out here to be safe from the war. If they're safe here, why do we have blackouts, air-raid shelters, sticky tape on windows, and we have to lie on the ground with a rubber between our teeth when we have air-raid practice?

Now I've got a blot on my page - somebody's put blotting paper in the inkwell and it's stuck on the end of the nib. And our work is marked for neatness as well as writing. It was probably one of the boys, they think it's funny.

There's the bell for play. I'll sell some more toffees for the War Effort, threepence a bag. I'll get a certificate when I've earned a pound. It's fun to watch Mum making them. When she pours the boiling toffee out onto the cold marble slab, sometimes I help by dabbing on little drops of essence or colour. The toffee's very hot when Mum pulls it out into long lengths, then folds it over and pulls it again. She has to be quick before it cools. When it sets like long sausages I help to break it up and put it in the bags. Everybody likes them - pink or yellow, but especially the green peppermint ones.

Now it's grammar and parsing sentences. What sort of phrase is this one. Has it got a verb? Is it a clause? What tense is the verb? Is it objective case? Now the monitor is getting our drawing books out of the cupboard. I get out my box of pastels. I've brought a picture of a sunset with a river and a boat to copy.

Lunchtime. Downstairs to the cloakroom to collect lunch, then out to the girls' shelter shed. Not the first one, that's for Babies and Grade 1 and 2's, ours is the end one. It always smells musty in here, and on some days the wind blows in dust. If it rains we stay in here all lunchtime. The teachers on



duty are always crabby, nobody's allowed to get off the seat until the next bell goes. I got into trouble last week for blowing up my lunch bag and popping it. I had to write 'lines' and give it to the teacher.

Last week Mum bought rainbow cake when we went shopping at Camberwell Market. We can't go at night now because of the blackout and Dad's saving up his petrol coupons so we can go on a holiday at Christmas. Because he can't get new tyres for the car he's glued strips of rubber around the old ones to make them last.

I fold up my lunch wraps and brown paper bag to take home and use again tomorrow. Now we can play tiggy, hopscotch, skippy, marbles, houses, or swap cards. I buy swap cards at the newsagent's for a penny each, or tuppence for special ones. Then I put them in an album.

After lunch we take out our Readers. We each stand up and read two sentences of 'The Loaded Dog'. Next we take out our sewing bags. We're knitting socks for sailors to help the War Effort. The boys do something else. Last year I knitted myself a cardigan. I used to sit under the big gum tree in the playground and knit at lunchtime.

We had a school concert at Camberwell Town Hall last year. Some of us girls dressed in white dresses and green aprons to dance the Irish jig and sing 'The dear little, sweet little shamrock of Ireland'. I also played in the fife band. We had fife lessons after school for threepence a week.

Now we have dancing lessons at school, and there's going to be a ball at the end of the year. We learn the 'Barn

Dance' and 'Pride of Erin' out on the asphalt. Dad complains that I wear out my shoes too quickly. We haven't got enough ration coupons for new shoes, so Dad keeps mending them. Mum says it would cost a fortune to keep taking them to the bootmaker. The bootmaker's shop is in the group of shops at the end of our street, near Hartwell station. It's a narrow shop and along the wall are shelves with rows of shoes upside down, names chalked on the soles. There's also a grocer, a greengrocer, a butcher, a newsagent where I buy exercise books and sometimes a 'Radio Fun' comic, a chemist, a barber, and a milk shop. Sometimes I go down there on Sundays with a jug to get a quarter-pint of cream, or I take the billy if we run short of milk.

On Fridays at school we have a lot of tests in the morning, then in the afternoon we take all our belongings out of our desks and stand out the front. We get new places to sit according to our test results. Those with highest marks sit at the back, then in descending order down the rows. It's nearly always the same ones who sit in the back row.

'Good afternoon, girls and boys.'

'Good afternoon, Miss Foster.'

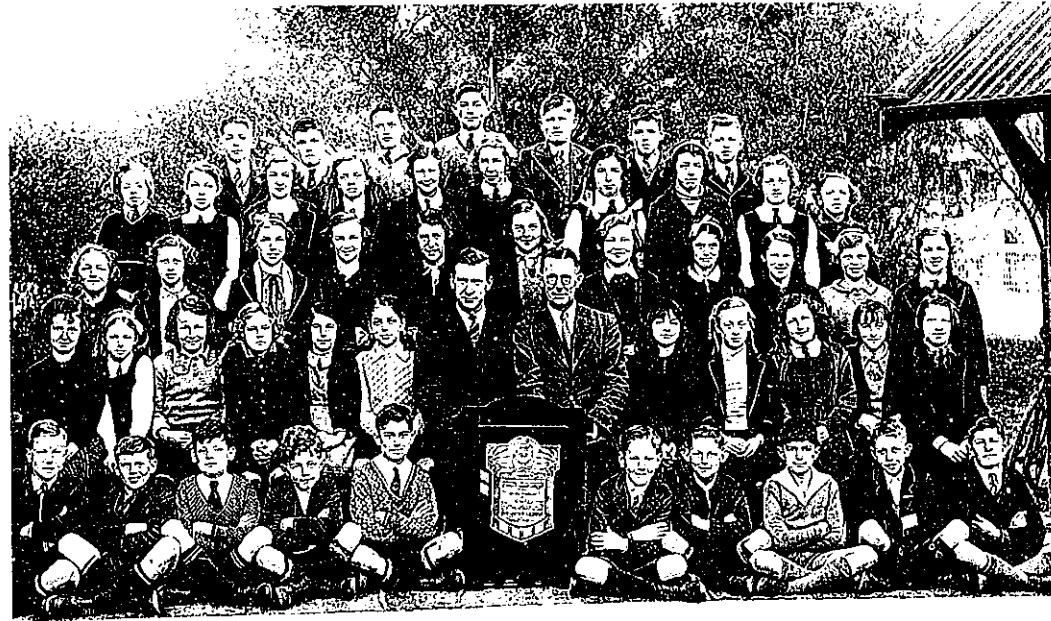
Out in two's, down to the cloakroom. I have to wait for my mother today, she's at a Mothers' Club meeting. Mum's the secretary, so she sometimes has extra to do after the other mothers have gone. There is a lot of work to do when the fete is on. Making toffee apples last year was fun. We went to the Victoria Market to buy a case of apples. Mum got a bag of wooden skewers from the butcher and Dad cut them all in half.

My brother and I helped to stick the skewers in the apples, then Mum dipped them in the hot toffee and put them in rows on a metal tray to cool.

At the fete I had an entry in the 'Decorated Saucer' section of the flower show, and I had a lucky dip for a penny. I liked watching the cold air coming off the dry ice on the ice-cream stall.

Mum tells me that the Mothers' Club are having a dance in the Star Hall in Trent Street - it's a twentieth birthday celebration. Slowly we walk up the hill to home.

'Fresh bread rolls! I'm starving!  
Can I have a roll with vegemite and cheese,  
please Mum?'

### 13. Captain of the Drum and Fife Band - *Ronald Greer, ASTC, FIE Aust., CP Eng.*

Having been at "Ashlyn" private school (Goodwin Street, Hartwell) for kindergarten and 1st class, I commenced at Hartwell State School in 2nd class in February 1941 and went through to 6th class, finishing in December 1945.

In 2nd class, the room was the first on the right after going up the back steps and turning left. It was my best relative class result at Hartwell, 2nd top! I can remember Jennifer Brown (now Pitts) and Dorothy Edwards who sat right behind me in the back row and came top. Punishment for boys was kneeling on the platform step with hands on head for what seemed like an eternity but was probably only a few minutes. Girls had to stand in the corner facing the corner.

There were two parallel classes for each year. I did 3rd class with Miss Gardiner. I thought she was quite old as she was tall and thin, with white hair and glasses. She was a good teacher and everybody liked her and was good for her. This was where we really learned to write – good, legible, well formed longhand, using pcns with nibs, ink in china inkwells, and blotting paper. We started reading the School Paper, prepared by the Education Department for all schools.

It may have been for the latter part of 3rd class and the earlier part of 4th class that we moved temporarily to an old weatherboard hall with a galvanised iron roof in Trent Street. It was about half way between Toorak Road and the Burwood railway station on the eastern side. There were at least two classes in the large hall and we were there for quite some

months. There was very little room to play outside as the hall took up most of the allotment.

Fifth class was with Mr Wiseman (by name and by nature). A kindly man (old we thought) with thin white hair. A very good teacher indeed – no nonsense, but well liked. He taught us stencilling and lino cut printing and allowed some boys to do woodwork and model making. His room was at the top of the wooden stairs at the north-east corner of the school.

Sixth class was with Miss Foster, 'Granny Foster'. She had a very high reputation for turning out well educated students, and parents all wanted their children to go through Miss Foster's class. If you were a troublesome student you were put in Mr Moody's 6th class.

Mr Moody was the school's disciplinarian. Naughty students (mostly boys) from all classes could expect to have an appointment made for them to be outside Mr Moody's door at a specified time; lookout if you weren't on time, and be apprehensive if you were! One, two, three, four or six of the best were yours for being sent there. Mr Moody was well known for his expertise with the strap.

I can only remember one case of graffiti (the word was unknown then). Someone used house paint on the brick wall facing the boys shelter shed to paint in big letters 'BUM'. Shock-horror! Without doubt the most offensive and unforgivable act of vandalism carried out during my five years at the school. Mr Moody did his utmost to uncover the culprit.

He failed, notwithstanding the in-depth investigation of the many boys he strongly suspected. Even after the most concerted efforts of removal, the word remained, faint but readable. I believe it was the work of a lad much older than a primary schoolboy, carried out long after home time. No boy at the school would have had the courage.

The boys uniform was light grey socks, shorts and jumper with a pale blue short sleeve shirt. There were caps, but nobody wore them for long. We had leather school bags to carry our books, pencils, lunch, etc. A few sissies had the bags which sit behind your shoulders with straps over the shoulders. Most had a long single strap slung diagonally over the shoulder. The girls had dark navy blue tunics with white blouses and long socks.

Lunches had to be eaten in the shelter shed and before going off to play. Anyone caught dropping papers or scraps had to clean up the whole yard. Mr Moody was particularly keen to keep the yard clean and tidy and to see that there was a minimum of tomfoolery while students were eating lunch. He was on duty often. The fashion of the day was the 'Oslo Lunch': cheese, tomato, lettuce, wholemeal bread and a piece of fruit. The Government introduced free milk for every school child. Special bottles were made; one-third pint (no flavouring). All milk bottles in those days had waxed cardboard lids and the milk had a thick layer of cream on the top. Waxed paper straws were also supplied (no plastics then). Apart from the free milk we drank water from the bubblers.

Almost everyone walked to school, including the teachers. A few may have had bicycles, a few may have caught the tram. There were no buses. I can't recall anyone whose parents had a motor car. Some had to walk a fair way, up to 1.8 km (1 km for me) rain, hail or shine.

There were shops in Toorak Road from Trent Street to Lithgow Street on the southern side. Crooks, the grocery chain, had a large store with big brass balance scales, complete with pans and weights, on the counter. Butter and cheese were cut from huge blocks on white marble slabs and weighed and wrapped customer by customer, as was flour and sugar which was scooped into brown paper bags from wooden barrels. These were fascinating operations to entertain schoolboys. There was no fish and chip shop, but there was a good lolly shop near Lithgow Street.

No one had much to spend, a ha'penny now and then, sometimes a penny. You could buy quite a few lollies for a ha'penny. The lollies were under the glass counter top or in glass jars on shelves behind the counter. Some were quite high requiring the shop keeper to use a pair of steps, and there was a lot of stretching for a few pence. They sold good meat pies, the big oval ones, hand made at the bakery. They were 3d. each ('thripence') and were considered expensive. I was allowed to buy a pie for lunch about 4 times a year (we probably couldn't afford it any more often).

It was about 4th class that I had the chance to learn to play a musical instrument – the fife. By 5th class I had become

reasonably proficient and was allowed to play in the school band. By 6th class I could play by ear anything I'd heard, and was appointed captain of the drum and fife band. My big moment was Monday mornings. The school assembled in class lines facing the back steps. The drum and fife band lined up in three rows on the right hand side of the steps. There was a bass drum, three kettle drums and about a dozen fifers.

The headmaster, Mr Sprake, would stand on the left hand masonry block at the end of the steps facing the assembly, and I stood on the right hand block next to the band. We looked over the heads of everyone.

Mr Sprake would call the assembly to attention, the Union Jack would be unfurled, and we would all say together, with the exception of the word 'cheerfully':

*'I love God and my country,  
I honour the flag,  
I will serve the king,  
And cheerfully obey my parents, teachers and the law.'*

This was followed by singing the National Anthem, 'God Save the King'. I would raise my baton for the drum roll to begin, then for the fifes to commence, and beat time to the assembly.

After Mr Sprake made his announcements, the classes would march in up the steps while we played 'March Militaire', 'Colonel Bogey', 'The Thin Red Line', 'Men of Harlech', or the like.

Most days started with mental arithmetic followed by reading, spelling, grammar, composition, the meaning of words, poetry, history and geography in some simple form, art work (drawing), craft work and nature study, not in this order. As I remember it, the hours were 9.15 am to 4.00 pm with lunch 12.15 to 1.30 pm. There was very little homework.

We played cricket on the pitch down in the yard, 'Tippidy Run', cherry bobs (in season), also 'Argles' (marbles), and war games (Allies vs Germans) where we pretended to be aeroplanes shooting at each other as we ran around with our arms extended. Collecting and swapping cigarette packets was popular. You couldn't do much with a football (the bare dirt and gravel).

The war affected everyone. Some had fathers away in the armed forces. Everyone worked for the war effort. Preserving eggs with 'Keepeg' and bringing them to school was a regular activity. After Darwin was bombed, there was an element of fear throughout the community. Plans were put in hand to evacuate children to the country when necessary (for what good it is hard to see). Some of us had a suitcase packed to go to our appointed destination at short notice (Shepparton for me).

The windows at home were blacked out with brown paper, light bulbs were removed from verandahs and street lights were shaded with metal shades. Motor cars had their headlights covered except for a small central hole. Older fathers not in the services spent a few weekends digging

trenches in the western playground. About three generally parallel rows zig-zagged from north to south. It was hard digging, all heavy clay, with hand picks and shovels, and the weather was hot.

We were drilled. At the sound of the air raid siren we'd drop whatever we were doing and line up outside the classroom door. As soon as we were assembled our teacher would march us down to our appointed trench – quickly but not running. On the sound 'All Clear', we'd march back and pick up where we'd left off. Fortunately, the trenches were never needed. After rain they were a hopeless, slippery mess, and it was just as difficult a job filling them in. We were in no doubt that this was not a game. We were not allowed to play in the trenches.

I well remember the end of the war in August 1945. It was announced at school and we were all sent home at about 10.00 am. Within a few weeks all school children were given a victory medal.

The majority of students left after 6th class to attend secondary school. Some boys and girls went on to Camberwell High School, some boys went to Melbourne High, some to Swinburne Junior Technical College, and about four boys went with me to Richmond Junior Technical School. Girls went either to MLC, PLC, Spring Road Central (Malvern) or Canterbury Girls High. The Hartwell State School had a fairly good reputation among the secondary schools for turning out good students.

For those who did not go on to secondary school there were 7th and 8th classes. They kept you at school until you were 14 when you could start work. You could get the 'Merit Certificate' if you finished 8th class. 7th and 8th class were taught by Mr Tanner.

On the last day of school for the year Mr Moody put on a moving picture show. There was a picture theatre in Hartwell at the corner of Toorak Road and Camberwell Road, the 'Regal', however most children went there rarely. So the last day of school was not to be missed.

Mr Moody's room was separated from Mr Wiseman's by folding doors which were opened up to make one large room, and we packed into it. He had a good projector, and he showed Charlie Chaplin, the Keystone Cops, Fatty Arbuckle, cartoons, Laurel and Hardy and the like, all in black and white. Very popular indeed. Free movies: what a way for school to break up!

*After 5 years at Richmond Junior Technical School, Ronald commenced work with the SEC (Vic) as an Apprentice Electrical Fitter. He won the award for Outstanding Apprentice (1954) and a scholarship to Swinburne Technical College, where he graduated as an Electrical Engineer. He continued working with SECV until 1962 when he moved to NSW and became Chief Electrical Engineer for PCCC Electricity based in Tamworth. After 31 years with them he retired in March 1994 to his 25 acre farmlet.*

#### 14. Mothers, Please Go Home - V. L. B.

It is February 1940 and I am sitting in a small wooden desk with anticipation, but some bewilderment. It is time to start class in 'Bubs' and there are a few quiet children sitting at the desks, but there is commotion outside the classroom. Many people are milling in the corridor, mothers and children are crying. There are raised voices from the headmaster and the teacher: 'Mothers, please go home.'

The sobbing, and some yelling, children are at last settled in the desks, and the mothers have gone. I stare with amazement. Why are they crying? I have looked forward to this day for so long! My two older sisters have given me

wonderful insights into school. I clutch my handed down slate and new slate pencil.

Miss Hurrey sits in front of the class and reads to us. There are exciting, imaginative stories, and later, play time. My sisters seek me out to show me off to their friends. After lunch we have a little sleep on mats on the floor. I like school.

\*

During the early 40s, we used red and blue lined exercise books in classes 'Bubs' and Grade 1. We were taught to form our cursive letters between the blue lines, extending h's, d's' t's, f's, g's, etc to the red lines. It was with a great sense of achievement that we graduated to blue lined exercise books after a couple of years.

Slates were used for simple addition and subtraction sums. We each had a damp sponge and a dry rag to clean the slate, which had its drawbacks. Slate pencils would squeak against the surface; 30 or 40 slate pencils in use created a very unpleasant sound. If the slate was turned over for use on the reverse side, the marks of pencil or chalk would transfer to whatever was underneath, including one's clothes. Slates could not be used if freshly cleaned with water. Most cleaning was carried out dry, resulting in clouds of slate and chalk dust. If dropped, the slate would shatter. Their use was limited, and slates were discontinued in the late 40's.

Drama in the classroom consisted of acting out simple

songs and stories. In the 'Bubs' and Grade 1 rooms, desks would be pushed back, and a large mat put in the middle of the floor. We changed our shoes for slippers which we kept in our desks. I remember the joy of putting on red woollen slippers, with a single button, and strap across the instep.

We sat on the mat and our teacher would read a simple story. Children were then selected to act out the story as teacher read it a second time. We would enact the same story again and again until each child had had a turn.

Sometimes the folding doors between the rooms 'Bubs' and Grade 1 would be opened, creating one large room. Both grades would participate in action songs and acting out nursery rhymes, for example, 'Polly put the kettle on'. As the rest of the children sang the nursery rhyme, Polly and Sookie would put the kettle on, or take it off, the open fire place in the corner of the room.

'Kindergarten of the Air' was a highlight for us. To hear the program, we had to go to the 'new' room on the west side of the school, close, but not joined to the main building. This room had a gigantic radio cabinet. Wearing our slippers, we would sit on the floor in a circle and listen enthralled to the slow speaking voice who told us when to hop, skip, sit down, be fairies, elephants or kangaroos.

I was 6 years old, in grade 2, when Japanese submarines entered Sydney Harbour. I knew nothing of this, only that we must be 'prepared', 'just in case'. Fathers dug 'slit' trenches

in the boys' schoolyard. What a surprise we had to see those mounds of earth extending down the schoolground like some gigantic curling caterpillars. During practice air-raids, we filed out of class as the siren sounded, and went into the trenches, one behind the other. Indeed, there was no space to move forward in any other way. We were given hard rubber pieces to put between our teeth, and instructed to bite down hard and crouch low in the trenches. Then it was all over, and we went back to class.

I thought it was quite exciting, and was not happy when our mother said her children were to come home in the event of an air-raid. Parents had been given this option, and forms were sent home, completed, and returned to the school. In order for children to be allowed to go home when an air-raid was imminent, these children must be able to complete the journey within a particular time limit.

I remember running, running, running up Wattle Valley Road to our home in Kalang Road, with a pain in my side, calling to my sister, 'Wait for me! Wait for me!'. 'Come on! Come on!' called my sister, who was always far, far ahead. Our mother, with clock in hand, waited at the gate for us. Then we returned to school, walking, with form completed. On another day, we carried out the same procedure up Nevis Street to determine which route was quicker. We never had a real air-raid, which was just as well for me, as I was sure my older athletic sister would outrun me, and forget me. I would have much preferred the trenches in the school yard.

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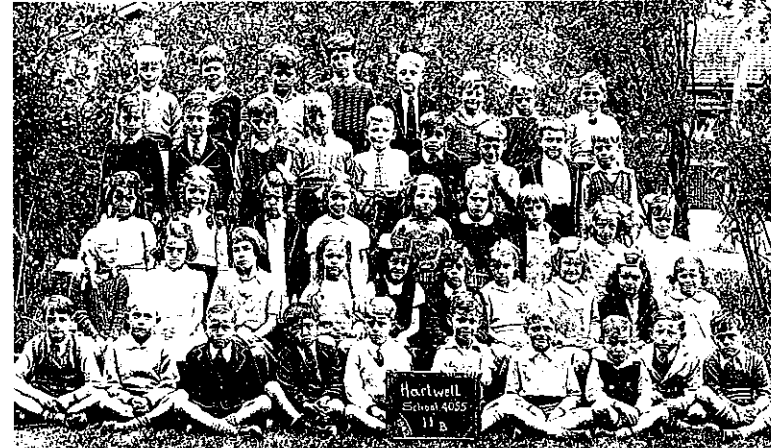
The newsagency in Toorak Road, near Lithgow Street, was a hub of activity. Pupils from the Hartwell State School could buy lead pencils, slate pencils, rubbers, exercise books and the famous 'School Paper' there. This small paper booklet was produced every month. There were two editions: one for grades 3 and 4, and one for grades 5 and 6, and inside was the pull-out spelling list. We were required to learn the words thoroughly, and there were subsequent spelling tests in class.

Money was tight in our family in those days, and, as I had a sibling in a higher grade, finances did not run to buying two School Papers. I had to persuade a friend to lend me their spelling list. This proved difficult, and when the spelling test came around, I would guess at the words. Of course, I did not earn a high score, but it made me determined to be a good speller.

The School Paper also contained stories, poems and articles about Australia's flora and fauna. Anyone who grew up with the School Paper must surely have a respect for Australia's bushland, resources and heritage. The newsagency also sold much sought after transfers of ships, planes, guns, camouflage tanks, and so on. With a little water we could transfer them to paper, or to the back of our hand.

One sad day, on Toorak road outside the newsagency, a school boy was hit by a car, and killed instantly. It was Frank Bennett, a pupil from my class. I did not witness the accident

but I saw the sawdust spread over the area where Frank was killed. It was my first encounter with death, and made a lasting impression on my young mind.

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In general, discipline at the Hartwell State School was not a problem. There were rules, all pupils knew what they were, and any infringement was quickly dealt with. Misdemeanours like being late for school, rudeness to teachers, stealing and fighting usually resulted in a letter being sent home to parents. Any absence from school required an immediate communication to the school by another person (few households had private telephones in those days), and a letter of explanation on the pupil's return to school.

Misbehaviour in the classroom by girls was often dealt with by making the child feel inferior or ashamed. Frequently, the girl would be sent to a lower grade and made to sit in a desk with a younger child, or the girl was made to sit in the front desk closest to the teacher's table, a position nobody wanted. To be sent to stand outside the classroom door was also shameful - all who passed by could observe. Repeated offences like talking in class resulted in the dreaded punishment of staying after school.

Offences by boys frequently resulted in 'the cuts'. The boy was made to stand in front of the class with hand and arm extended, and held higher than the shoulder. The strap would be brought down so hard that it inflicted pain and a welt over the hand and up the arm. One strike was usual, but sometimes two or three were given. Most of the seated pupils watched motionless, but some of the girls, including myself, were always upset when the cuts were inflicted. Some would raise their desk tops so that they did not have to watch. Only male teachers used the strap, and some had the reputation of being 'better' at it than others. Female teachers would send an offending boy to the headmaster.

\*

Mr Sprake, the headmaster, was a kindly, quietly spoken man. He was of average height, stooped, balding and somewhat stout. This delightful gentleman actually lived in our street, almost opposite. We both walked to school and left our houses at approximately the same time each day. I wanted to walk with

him, but I was too shy. One day my mother was bidding me farewell at the gate, and, seeing Mr Sprake leave his home, suggested that I walk with him. I caught up with him and he was pleased. We didn't talk much, but as the days and weeks went by, it became a ritual to walk to school together. I always left his side before we arrived at the school, and I never told any of the children of my company to school.

I remember one day Mr Sprake asked me which was my favourite subject. I was a good student, so this was not a difficult question. He then asked me which subject I liked least. To this question I replied, 'History'. I have never forgotten his answer, which at that time amazed me.

'I have never liked history. It is like turning over dead men's bones.'

\*

V.P. Day came in September 1945. I was 9 years old and in grade 5. We were all given victory medals. Those children who had fathers or brothers in the war were given a holiday on the day their family member returned home.

Miss Foster, the Grade 6 teacher, had left the school, and we were very keen to know who would be our teacher the following year. Word soon went round that the Hartwell State School was to have two new male teachers: returned soldiers! What anticipation! At last they arrived: Mr Brown and Mr Hovenden. They were both thin and walked very fast. I had never seen anybody walk as fast as these two soldiers did. One of them had a nervous twitch. The two were often together and

were immensely popular. They were athletic and played football with the boys. Mr Hovenden was the Grade 5 teacher, and Mr Brown, Grade 6.

I was apprehensive, as I had never had a male teacher before. However, both men were kind, excellent teachers. I played the fife – no lessons – but was able to play any tune I had memorised. Mr Brown was very excited when I played 'Colonel Boogie' for the class. It was many years later that I learnt both men had been prisoners of war, and had come direct from a P.O.W. camp.

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#### Games we played in the 40's

**Hidey** - One child covered his/her face or stood close to a tree or building (without peeping) and counted to 10. He/she then shouted, 'Coming, ready or not', and went to seek out all those who had hidden. Of course, this game often caused frustrations, and fractured friendships, when one impatient child, tired of waiting to be 'found' would go away to play with other children. Or else the child who was 'seeking' pretended not to 'find' the others, thus prolonging the game and holding 'power' over the other children.

**Tiggy** - This was a universal favourite. Any number of children could play. One child was nominated to go 'he' and had to touch another 'on the run'. It was a real show of who were the fastest runners, and best dodgers.

**Cherry bobs** (seasonal) - Traditionally a boy's game, and although some girls would have dearly loved to join in, the

'boys only' taboo was jealously guarded. Small holes were scooped by hand in the dry dust, each hole representing a different value. Cherry stones were thrown to the holes from a determined line, and scoring was achieved by how many cherry stones landed in the holes. Individual's cherry stones were coloured or spotted.

This game appeared in summer, after the first cherries were in the green-grocer's shop. Another version of cherry bobs was with the use of a 'toodelumbuck'. A flat piece of plywood was marked in sections with numbers. By an upright support, the toodelumbuck would be spun. Holes in the dust or around the roots were already numbered and held the player's cherry stones. This game allowed you to win many cherry bobs from the others.

**Alleys** – Usually a summer game: one of those 'craze' activities. One child would suddenly appear with marbles, then another, then ten, and soon, the whole school-yard. Boys and girls all played marbles. We had marble bags; big bags if we were experts, small bags for beginners. We had tom bowlers, squids, dumps and rainbows. Circles were drawn in the dirt, or with chalk on the concrete areas. Up to half a dozen players would place a 'dump' in the circle, and then take turns to fire the marbles out, using a carefully selected 'shooter'. Like gambling, marble playing was addictive. Often losing more and more marbles, one would keep playing, hoping that the next game would bring more luck. Actually it was pure skill, but one never quite knew the ability of one's opponent. A

large bulging alley bag was not openly displayed, but rather kept secretly hidden so that others would not be aware of the player's ability.

**Skippy** – an all weather game, and definitely for girls only. Another craze activity. One girl would bring a rope to school, then another, then the whole class, and finally, ropes all over the girls' playing area. There were single ropes for skilful people, but the popular form was the long jump rope. Two girls would take an end each, and turn the rope for as many children who wanted to participate. A child must run in and jump the rope, then run out if they so desired, but if they fouled the turning rope, they must drop out of the game. The remaining girl was the champion skipper. Versions of skippy were: French, Double French, Over the waves, Dutch and Double Dutch.

**Swap cards** – Another activity for girls only. Also a craze game. Swapping cards was not always strictly honest, and there were many tears and accusations associated with this game. Those clever enough to deceive and persuade often took advantage of younger or naive children. It was possible to take to school brand new cards of superior design, and by the end of the day have in one's possession a bunch of old, dirty, dog-eared cards, and not quite know how it happened. Highly sought after cards included those with a linen-like surface. They made a very satisfying noise when scratched with a finger nail. Then there were 'pairs': two cards not identical but

obviously similar, always swapped as a pair. There were gilt-edged and silver-edged cards, plain backs, and jokers.

From the youngest to the oldest, every girl had a pack of cards. The school authority tried to keep the card swapping 'clean' by making rules like only swapping with your own class mates. When the card situation got out of hand, cards were banned from school. So it ended, until the craze returned next year.

**All in games** – These were the most popular of all. Every child who wanted to could participate in the same game. Even the teachers would join in, or organise the start. The games included: 'The farmer's in the dell', 'Here we go gathering nuts in May', 'Oranges and lemons', 'Drop the hanky', 'Twos and threes', 'Streets and Lanes' (often started but usually proved too complicated for most children).

**Hoppy** – Patterns of squares would be drawn with chalk on the asphalt or by a stick in the dust. A 'taw', a coveted piece of broken china or tile, was tossed underarm to a particular square. Then began the hopping from square to square, picking up the taw, and then hopping back to the start. The second player then took their turn. The game would be extended and made more difficult until one child was the champion hopper. This game was limited to older girls, as it was too difficult for smaller children.

## 15. 1950's: A Royal Visit to the Babyboomers

The 1950's were the years when rock and roll, Elvis Presley, refrigerators, the Can-O-Mat, Victa lawnmowers, sewered lavatories, the Holden motor car, European migrants, the Olympic Games, television, and the new Queen of England came to Australia. They were years of confidence, when there was very little unemployment. Many Australians strove to build their own brick veneer home with a Hills Hoist in the back yard. They were also the years of the Baby Boom.

Hartwell State School reached its maximum attendance of 753 children in 1952, and two new timber classrooms were added to the north-east corner of the school in 1955. The Church of Christ hall had been rented from late 1949 to accommodate some classes. In 1951 the grounds were terraced at a cost of £6000. In 1955 the school became a training school for teachers.

The school continued to participate successfully in inter-school sports in these years, winning trophies. Miss Eleanor Foster retired as a teacher on 29th June, 1956. She was over 70.

The young Queen's visit in 1954 is remembered as a highlight. Selected Hartwell students participated, along with many other children, in the welcoming display in the Melbourne Cricket Ground. Dianne Day (nee Ellis) remembers being bitterly disappointed when her teacher stopped her from participating in the may pole dance because she was late for school one morning.

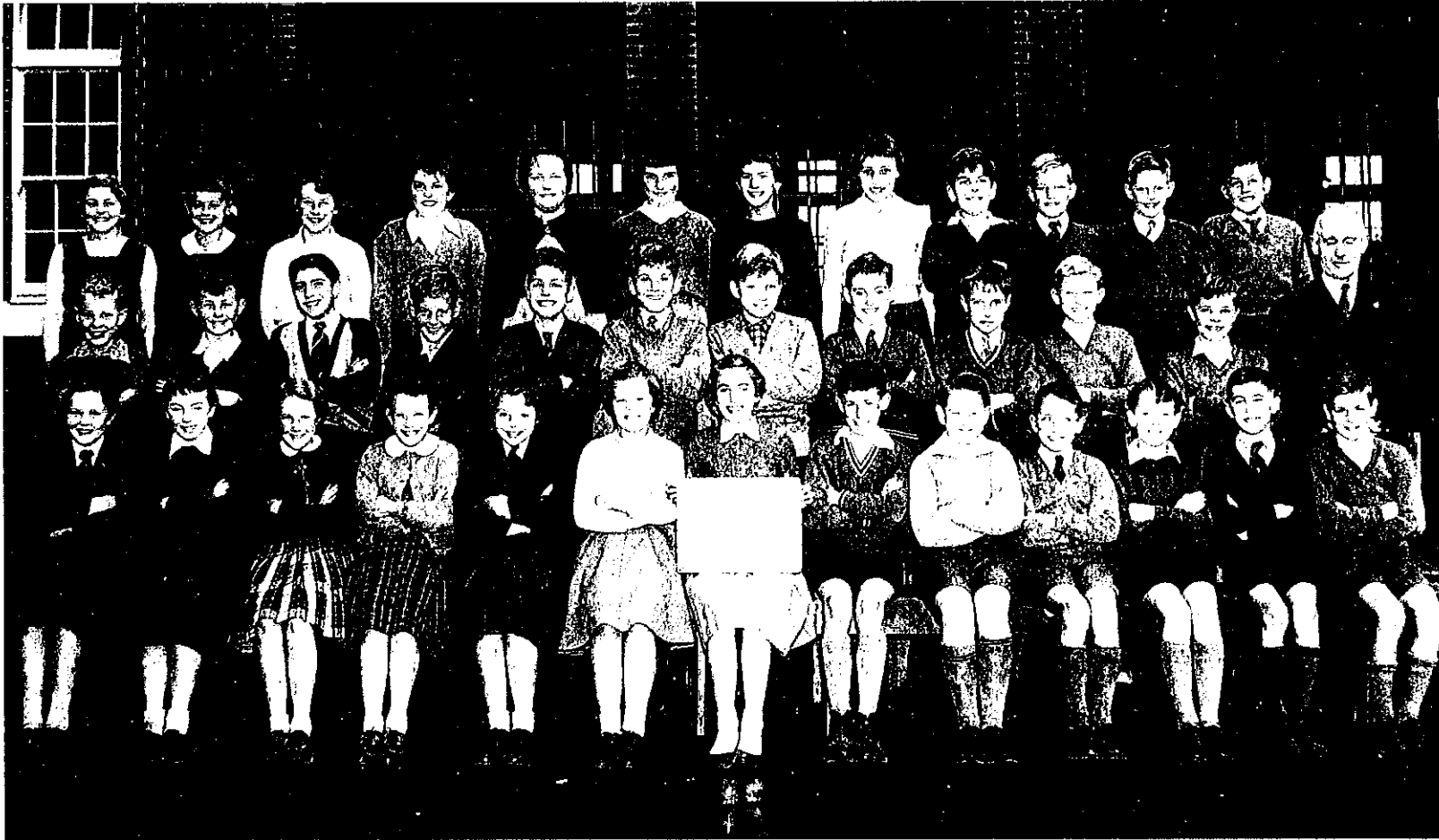
Mrs Lorna Camm, who taught at the school in the early 1950's and was also a parent of three students, remembers that polio was still a threat. Some children wore camphor in little bags on string around their necks to try and avoid contagion. Vaccine for polio was introduced in 1955.

Many students of these years have special memories of Mr Alan McInnes, who taught Grade 6. Euan Nichol, one of those students, describes him:

*'A fine teacher who was precise and directed. The enduring memory, and it was inspirational, of Mr. McInnes came from the period after our Year 6 work had been completed, results and our future schools known, time to be filled in before the long "hols" began. Mr McInnes began to gently read from his diary, and as his story unfolded, the reason for his gnarled and distorted hands and slight facial disfigurement became clear. During the war Mr McInnes achieved the elite position as pilot in the select Australian Lancaster-bomber Pathfinder Squadron. He was shot down over Germany, escaped from the burning plane (hence the skin disfigurement), survived with a parachute, was captured and imprisoned till the war ended. His reading of the daily life before and after his capture was inspirational to the 53 boys in the class, and rapt attention bore witness to this. I met Mr McInnes many years later, retired and looking very fit*

*(an avid tennis player). He hadn't changed at all, still the strong upright stance, sharp penetrating eyes and*

*smiling face. An enduring character that in some way fashioned all the lives of the 6th grade boys in 1954.'*

## 16. Hours of Instruction - *Thomas A. (Tom) Perkin*

I taught at Hartwell School from September 1950 to September 1953. Mr James Wilson, the Head Teacher, was a great organiser of his school and kept in close touch with his teaching staff and the children. He was a WWI ex-serviceman having landed on Gallipoli in 1915.

Mr Wilson was also a lover of animals. All the dogs who frequented the playground were treated as his 'pals'. The dogs would wait for him each morning, and he would say, 'What have you been doing, pal?' I saw him, on more than one occasion, come out to the morning assembly with a cat purring on his shoulder. On occasions when the council dog catcher was in the street, he would take any dogs in to the little room off the office (which was to the left as you enter the front door of the school), shut the door, and say, 'Stay there pals – he won't find you in here!'

Other Teachers: Miss Thomas (Infant Mistress), Mr W. Tanner, Mr M. Kilvighon, Mr A. Scabrook, Miss J. Jamieson, Miss D. Olsson, Miss A. Mills, Mrs Sylvia Lee Dow, Mr Alan Richards, and others.

Inspectors of Schools: Mr Bacon and Mr Weir.

Correspondent of School Committee: Mr J. D. H. Scrivener.

The teachers' Time Book had to be signed by each teacher on arrival and departure each day. Names were recorded in the Time Book in order of seniority as shown in the

classified roll of primary teachers. The official Course of Study set out the minimum requirements and time allotments of the various subjects to be taught. Each class teacher was required to prepare a work program setting out that part of the Course of Study to be covered each week. The work program of each teacher had to be presented to the Head Teacher for his signature each Monday morning.

When appointed to Hartwell I was given charge of a Grade III of 57 boys. Our grade room was the one detached from the main building. In January 1951 through to mid-1952 I had charge of Grade IV, a grade of boys and girls in a room in the main building. In mid-1952 Mr Tanner (Grade VI teacher) retired through illness, and I was transferred to his

Grade VI. I remained in charge of Grade VI until my transfer on promotion to Tottenham North School.

While teaching Grade VI, I shared the teaching load with Miss Jamieson (teacher of the other Grade VI). I undertook the teaching of Music and Science/Health Subjects for both grades, while Miss Jamieson undertook the teaching of Social Studies (History and Geography) to both grades.

The main school building was on three levels. The room on the top level was used as the Staff Room. The Head Teacher's office was on the left side immediately after entering the front door. Infant grades were housed on the ground floor, with Grades III to VI on the second level.

At this time, the area of the playground was extremely small for the number of children who were to use it. It was not possible to play games like cricket and football satisfactorily in the grounds of the school, or to play team games like tunnel ball and cross ball. Often we would take groups of children and practise in Stormoway Street (not much worry of traffic in 1950), or in Lynden Park. When we played football or cricket against other schools, we walked the teams to Hartwell Sports Ground in Bath Road.

Hours of instruction were 9:15 to 12:15 and 1:15 to 3:30 each day. Infant School pupils were dismissed at 3:15. This had to do with the so-called inability of the younger children to cope with concentration as long as other children, and also with the facility of dismissal without interruption of the older children. Some would have said that it enabled the

younger children to be clear of the grounds before the dismissal of the senior school, but in fact the younger children were often required by their parents to wait for their elder brothers or sisters before setting off home.

School began each day with a general assembly of all grades, and class teachers were expected to be at assembly with them. After instruction from the Teacher in Charge, (and, if desired, comments from the Head Teacher), the children marched to their rooms to drum music provided by a bass drum and two kettle drums. One of the extra duties I assumed while at Hartwell was to train the drummers. After the retirement of Mr Tanner, I was required to take charge of assemblies.

Every Monday morning assembly took a specific form. The Australian flag would be raised to the masthead prior to the assembly time, and left furled. After the children had taken their places at assembly, the Head Teacher would request the boys to come to attention and salute the flag (girls were not required to salute). Simultaneously, a drum roll would signal the flag monitor to unfurl the flag on the mast. This was achieved by the monitor pulling on the rope and thus releasing the flag to fly in the breeze. All children were then required to repeat the declaration, and the flag would remain flying for the rest of the school day.

Anzac Day (25th April) was always a school holiday. On the day prior to Anzac Day, a solemn ceremony was performed. The flag was flown at half mast in memory of

deceased servicemen and women. Children assembled near the flag pole in mid-afternoon, and it was usual for a short address to be given to inform the children of the meaning of Anzac. Then the wreath was laid at the foot of the flag pole, and the lines from Lawrence Binyon's poem 'For the Fallen' were repeated: 'They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.' This was followed by a trumpet call of 'The Last Post', followed immediately by the 'Reveille'. At the first notes of the 'Reveille', the flag was raised to the masthead, and the children quietly left the school to go home.

In the 1950's classes were very large compared with today. Each individual teacher needed to keep firm control of members of the class if worthwhile learning was to result. The ability of individual teachers to keep order in the class varied, of course, according to the personality of each teacher. At recess time, when children were in the playground, it was necessary to have teacher supervision to prevent unwarranted behaviour of children towards each other.

Corporal punishment was permitted under Regulation XXIV which stated:

*'Teachers shall avoid all degrading punishments as such punishments are likely to produce bodily harm to pupils. The Head Teacher shall be held responsible for the nature and extent of punishment inflicted in the*

*school. Corporal Punishment shall be administered only as provided hereunder:*

*(a) It shall be reserved for cases of grave misconduct, and shall not be inflicted for slowness, dullness, or failure to comprehend what is being taught.*

*(b) It shall be inflicted on boys only.*

*(c) The instrument employed shall be a strap.*

*(d) The only method to be employed shall be that of strapping the pupil on the palm of either hand, such methods as boxing or pulling the ears, rapping the knuckles, or requiring the pupil to stand for excessive periods being prohibited.*

*(e) It shall be administered only by the Head Teacher and by such assistants as he may authorise.*

*(f) It shall not be administered by a student teacher.'*

The Head Teacher was required to enter from time to time in the Register of Corporal Punishment the names of the assistant teachers authorised by him to inflict corporal punishment. The nature of the offence, the extent of the punishment, the date on which the punishment was administered and the name, age and grade of the pupil were also required to be entered in the Register. The school was permitted to supervise behaviour on the way to and from school, where such behaviour was considered to have a detrimental effect on school discipline.

In my experience corporal punishment was used sparingly. I can remember (from my time at Hartwell) only

two occasions of its use. One referred to a boy who grossly and repeatedly maltreated another boy on the way home from school by wrestling him to the ground and spitting in his mouth. The other referred to a boy who used abusive and insulting words to a lady teacher. In this case the Head Teacher requested me to administer corporal punishment, which I did, and in addition sent a note home to the parents giving them full detail of the offence and the punishment. That boy was absent for three days following the punishment, and, as the family had previously reported teachers to the Education Department, other staff members were *sure* I would be in trouble. The boy returned to school with a note which stated he had been ill for three days, and thanking me for taking the action I did after his 'disgraceful behaviour'. At Christmas time he gave me a book in thanks for what I had done for him.

During my three years at Hartwell, it was my privilege to have the opportunity to assist the teaching program in the following extra-curricular duties:

**Folk Dancing:** This was introduced to all Grades III to VI. The grades were assembled on the asphalt surface of the playground with their own teachers assisting. Recorded music was provided through the public address system.

**Visual Education:** The School possessed a silent 16 mm. film projector. Being qualified in visual education, I was able to sell this projector to the Visual Education Section of the Education Department, and persuade the School Committee to buy a new sound-on-film projector and screen. I undertook to

train staff members to operate the machine, and also instruct them in the correct method of use of sound film. The general method was for the teacher to preview the film to be used, and then to prepare the class to be ready to find the answers to questions set. I made time available for training after school hours for those who wished to qualify, and I made a special wooden stand to hold the projector at the required height. One room was fitted with draw curtains so that it could be darkened, and grades would go to this room to view the films.

**Part Singing:** I introduced part singing to Grade IV in 1951. Having established a School Choir at my previous school (Canterbury), I proceeded to do so at Hartwell. This Choir was invited to sing at the Royal Horticultural Society's Annual Concert in the Melbourne Town Hall on Thursday 13th December 1951. I was conductor and Mrs Lee Dow was pianist. The Choir sang two brackets: 'Australia Happy Isle', and 'O Who Will O'er The Downs', and in the second bracket, 'Silent Night', and 'Jesu Joy of Man's Desiring'.

All of the foregoing happened before the days of:

- School crossings and Supervisors
- Small classes
- Specialist teachers in certain subjects
- Television

I spent 46 years in the Primary Teaching Service, and my three years at Hartwell were among the most pleasant and gratifying of my teaching experiences.

## 17. Flag Drill with the Bombardier - *Barry Barton*

I attended Hartwell School from 1951 to 1954, and at the time lived in Through Road, Burwood. Janice Camm (now my wife) also attended the school, and lived across the road. Through Road has not changed much, except that in those days it was a bus route through to Toorak Road. 17 Through Road was the rented dwelling of the infamous gangster Freddy Harrison, who was gunned down on the Melbourne wharf. I remember walking back to school at lunchtime, and seeing him attach his trailer to his car a couple of hours before his demise.

Memories of the Hartwell area: we were taken to the Regal Cinema for a Christmas treat at the end of each year; Morgan's Bakery delivered bread by horse and cart and sometimes we could get a lift back to school after lunch in the baker's cart; children would gather around the back of Eacott the iceman's truck for a handful of ice; the school had its account at the E.S. & A. bank in Hartwell, and the Principal, Mr Wilson, would come into our class and request two good boys to do the banking, with our reward being an icecream.

Assembly at school was held outside, after which we marched into class while the boys played the drums and girls played the fifes. On Mondays, we had the added 'pledge of allegiance' to the King, then to the Queen after the death of George VI in 1952.

Milk was provided every morning in half pint bottles, and then one third pint bottles when it was found that young

children couldn't drink half a pint of warm (after standing in the sun) unflavoured milk.

The grounds were covered in fine river gravel, and gravel rash was the order of the day after vigorous games of 'hop-O-bump-O' and the like. Another game was called 'WORLD', where you drew out lands in the gravel and tried to annex each others' territory. Boys also played marbles and cricket, and once a week we would walk along Yeovil Road to the playing fields which were bordered by Bath Road to play sport.

In 1951 Melbourne experienced quite a heavy fall of snow, and I can remember the great excitement as we threw snow-balls at each other. Our classroom was out in the weatherboards that year, and we had an open hearth fire. Our teacher, Mr Richards, was a great one for the open fire.

In class, you spent a great deal of time at your desk. However, you always stood when your teacher or another teacher appeared in the room. The desks had lift up tops or a slide in shelf for your school bag. Each desk was fitted with holes for an inkwell.

Classes were very large, often numbering over 50. You sat arranged according to your monthly test results. Those with the highest score sat at the back of the class, usually against the window. Each month your test score would dictate a change of seat, unless you were Michael Coulthard who always scored top marks and so never had to vacate his seat.

The 3 R's were drilled. We 'sang' our tables forwards and backwards in Grade 3 with Mr Richards. English included 'parsing' – subject, verb, predicate, clauses, etc. Other subjects included health, nature studies, and social studies. There was no science. There were drum lessons for boys along the wall of the lower playground each week. The school provided the drums but you had to buy your own drum sticks.

The 'strap' or 'ruler' were all the go for discipline. Alan McInnes had a variation where you had to put out both hands together and each blow effectively numbed both hands. No one in the boys' grade 5 class will forget the teacher belting into the legs of some unfortunate boy with a heavy ruler, when he couldn't do his sums on the black board. In desperation he eventually told her to 'drop dead'. There was another occasion when the same teacher decided that the whole class were to receive the strap, and she began to line up all 52 to be belted. Some boys re-joined the queue sensing that exhaustion had long taken the sting out of the strap.

In Grade 3, girls had Miss Foster, boys had Mr Richards. In Grade 4 there were mixed classes taught by Miss Olsen and Mr Seabrooke. Mr Seabrooke also taught his own son, Glynden.

Mr Seabrooke was kindness personified. I remember one day when my dog, who usually never left our back garden, turned up at school, and then ran off before I could grab him. I was distraught and Mr Seabrooke excused another boy and myself to look for him. At 3.15 we returned to school,

unsuccessful in our search. Mr Seabrooke then drove us around the streets of Burwood and Hartwell in his car for another 2 hours. We finally found Waggs in the Hartwell shopping centre, after which Mr Seabrooke took us home. It was that same year that I was forced to miss a few weeks of school after undergoing surgery. Mr Seabrooke provided equipment and materials so that I could continue leatherwork during my convalescence.

In Grade 5 there was some staff movement during the year, and, whilst we started the year with Mr McInnes, he moved up to take the Grade 6 boys and we had Miss Mills for the remainder of that year. In Grade 6, girls had Miss Jamieson and boys had Mr McInnes, though Miss Jamieson took the boys for Health and Nature Studies, whilst Mr McInnes took the girls for some subjects.

A major event was the Royal Visit in 1954. Boys and girls were to take part in a special pageant on the MCG to welcome Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh. We were drilled for over a year in flag drill for the boys, and flower and maypole dancing by the girls. Mr McInnes took charge of the boys and his experience in the RAF ensured that we were drilled to perfection. The boys from Hartwell formed part of the first 'E' in the word 'Welcome' formed by the children.

There was keen competition to get into the best High Schools at the end of Grade 6. Only the best couple of students gained a place at Melbourne HS. Michael Coulthard, always at the top of the class, and Euan Nichol were successful.

Camberwell HS was also much sought after, and there was a relatively small number of places allocated to Hartwell. In our year I can remember that some of the boys who went on to Camberwell HS included:

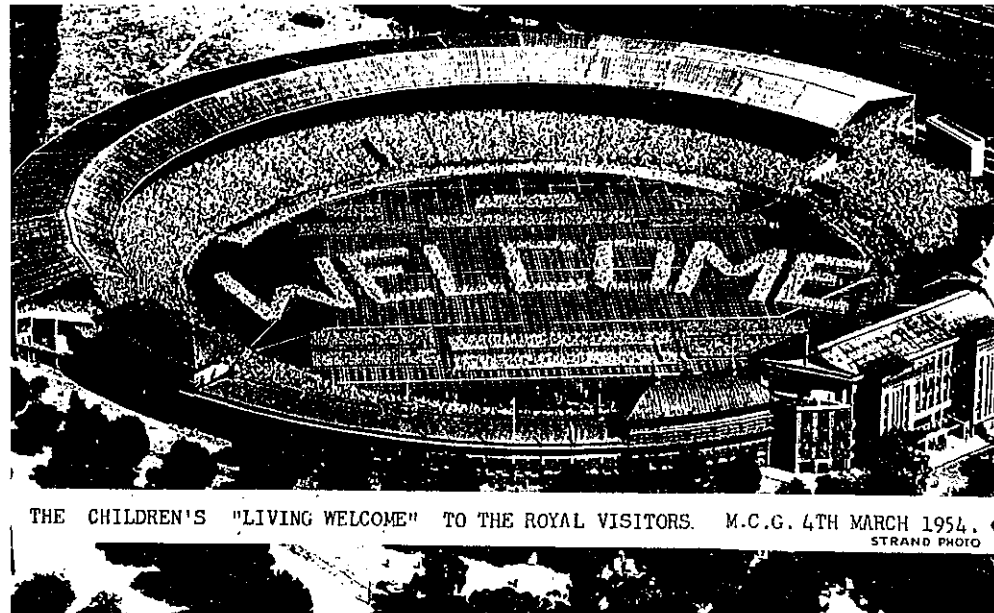
Kerry Pratt (now Professor Pratt and pro Vice-Chancellor, Swinburne)

Donald McKenzie (now a doctor living in Perth)

Ian Gibson, Robert Pearce, John Kenny and others.

Burwood HS commenced in 1955 and many Hartwell students opted for the new school. However it did not proceed beyond Year 11 (Form V) and some former Hartwell students joined Camberwell HS in 1960 to do their Matriculation.

Mr Alan McInnes, my Grade 6 teacher, was a very special person and had an enormous impact on my life. He had us boys eating out of his hand. Having been a bombardier with the R.A.F., he had been shot down, and then was a P.O.W. in Germany. He had kept a diary and, if we young boys behaved, he would read us extracts from the diary at the end of the day. I have not forgotten his descriptions of London, and his ability to communicate with young students. Sixteen years after leaving Hartwell, another student (Kerry Pratt) and I were walking through London for the first time. Kerry turned to me and said, 'It's just like Alan McInnes described it'.

## 18. Initials on the Boundary - Ian Devenish

The biggest change I have witnessed since I was a boy at Hartwell School (1951-1956) has been the destruction of, what used to be, the Hartwell shopping centre. A family could purchase all of its requirements in the shops that lay along Toorak Road between Highfield and Summerhill Roads. The shops included a butcher, grocer, chemists (2), wool shop and supplier of local school stationery, hairdresser, hardware (2), etc. There was also a Cottees factory on the south side of Toorak Road. In later years Service Stations broke the continuity of shops which led to the development of the shopping centre west of Summerhill Road. Later, when the

petrol outlets closed, large office blocks took their place.

I lived in, and still live in, Callanish Road which is only a few minutes walk to the school. The street-scape has changed somewhat, in that many of the original trees have been replaced with natives. Several of the houses have been replaced by units, and there are more vehicles. Physically, the area is much the same as it was when I was a boy. The changes are reflected more in the nature of the way people live.

For the first year my mother would take me to school. We would walk. Thereafter, as I recall, I would walk by myself, or join up with a friend from a nearby street. It was considered quite safe in those days to let children go to school on their own. In grade six I was given a bicycle for my birthday, and for the latter half of 1956 I rode it to school and left it in the garage of a nearby house in Oberwyl Road.

I remember one or two classrooms that were supplementary to the original building. These were located on the north-west corner. There was a shelter shed approximately where the present library is. Shelter sheds were located between the lower playground and the north side of the school, just to your right as you walk in at the Oberwyl Road entrance. This was the site where students were given the free bottle of milk to drink each morning. There are few things worse than warm milk. There were two toilet blocks, one for girls and one for boys. The boys' toilets were pretty primitive and placed some



distance from the school. This meant getting very wet in winter and rather hot in summer.

The playgrounds were all gravel, except the quadrangle which was asphalt. They seemed very large to a small boy. The west playground has been grassed in recent years and the landscaping has been improved. I notice that many of the gum trees that were there are still healthy and growing well.

Most students were attired casually. There was a uniform of sorts which consisted of a school jumper and matching socks. Grey shorts were commonly worn with the uniform, which I should add was optional. Looking at my school photographs there's not much evidence of any uniform in the lower grades. We were expected to wear suitable clothing for sporting activities, such as heavy shoes for football. Some children had proper football boots but it was not compulsory.

We began with morning assembly in the quadrangle. A fife and drum band accompanied us into our classrooms. I seem to remember reciting an oath to God, Queen and Country. Some of us had our own words to this particular affirmation. Morning classes took us up to morning recess, or playtime as it was termed. More classes preceded lunchtime.

The 3 R's were high on the agenda during my period at Hartwell. We learnt by rote our times tables up to twelve. We had regular spelling tests in class, which were graded according to our level. We began learning to read and write at a very early stage in our schooling, and I can remember first learning script writing with a pen and ink in grade four. Other subjects

that come to mind included Health, Nature study and Music. There was a school paper which cost one penny, and was an education department publication. The boys were treated pretty much the same as the girls with the exception of sport, where we were separated to pursue our different interests.

A popular game amongst the boys and some of the girls was marbles. French cricket was another, as well as regular cricket. Football was played during the winter. Girls played basketball and softball. Skipping ropes were almost mandatory. Hula hoops were a favourite craze at one stage, as was the ubiquitous yo yo. Another practice which was prevalent for a little while was burning one's initials on the wooden boundary fence with a magnifying glass.

Vegemite sandwiches were pretty numerous at lunchtime, as was buttered bread with hundreds and thousands sprinkled on top. My lunch generally consisted of a meat salad sandwich with a piece of cake and an apple. Some of my friends had cold jaffles, and from time to time we were allowed, with a written note from parents, to go down to the fish and chip shop in Hartwell and purchase a hot meal. Once a month the mothers' club organised salad rolls for students for a small payment to cover costs. This was something to which I always looked forward. My mother was involved in the mothers' club in various ways, but mainly in preparing these lunches, and with the occasional fete.

Lunch was generally one hour in duration, and during cold winter days monitors were appointed to watch over the

wood fires which were the chief sources of heat in some of the classrooms. Ink monitors were also common in higher grades. This was a very messy job and lots of ink found its way on to desks and clothing.

If inappropriate behaviour warranted the strap we were sent to one of two teachers (male) to receive our just deserts. One particular teacher, a man of rather rotund proportions, had great difficulty keeping his trousers on after removing his belt to inflict the penalty. This was a standing joke amongst the boys who were sent to him.

Detention after school lessons was sometimes, but not often, employed. Most discipline was exercised in the class at the time of the misdemeanour. Usually a good 'ticking off' in front of one's peers did the trick.

The Headmaster (as was the title used in those days) was a Mr Wilson. I think he retired while I was a student at Hartwell because he was replaced by a Mr Arnold. Mr Wilson was a kindly man, very fair, and well liked by students.

My recollection of the polio epidemic is very clear. Many children were kept away from school and at least two students known to me contracted the disease. It was a very worrying time for parents even if the children didn't fully understand what was involved.

I can remember most of my teachers and many of the students. I have kept in touch with one or two over the years. One teacher in particular was very good to me when I was in grade two. I was very sick early in the term and in fact did not

attend school for many weeks. When I was well enough to do lessons, but still not able to attend school, she would send home, via a friend of mine, the lessons and homework that she had taught that day. I would return the answers the following day. This enabled me to keep up with the rest of the class so that on my return I was not too far behind the others. She was a very kind and thoughtful person.

## 19. 1960's: Poetry and Pigeons

The Beatles and the Vietnam War made the 1960's memorable. In 1966, dollars and cents replaced pounds, shillings and pence in Australia, and the process of converting weights and measures to metric began. In 1967, American President Lyndon Johnson visited Australia, and Prime Minister Harold Holt disappeared in the surf at Portsea. In 1969, men walked on the moon, and the Women's Liberation Movement began. More women entered the workforce, but they continued to receive lower wages than men.

Segregation of boys and girls was still practised at school. Coral Chen (Hepworth) remembers being disciplined with a ruler across the legs for being in the boys' yard. Janet Tobin (Pollard) recalls that in Grade 5 girls did sewing and boys did gardening, there was no choice. However, these activities often depended on individual teachers; some boys remember doing needlework with Miss Foster in earlier years. The strap was usually reserved for naughty boys. Both boys and girls were divided into four 'houses', Blue, Green, Gold, and Red, and competed against each other in an annual sports day.

A Rural Training School (RTS) was established at the school by the Education Department in 1960. This functioned as a class of the school and comprised 3-4 children from each grade level with a maximum of 20-24 pupils. There was a balance of boys and girls, and students were encouraged to volunteer for inclusion in the class. If not enough volunteered,

then the Head Teacher had to try and recruit more. A suitably experienced teacher was appointed to run the RTS.

Hartwell was chosen as the site for the RTS as a drop in enrolments had led to there being a vacant classroom at the school. Mr Arnold had wanted to set the room up as a Craft Room, but had been unable to gain approval for a specialist teacher. Parents and the Headmaster expressed concern to the Education Department about the establishment of the RTS; parents felt they had not been consulted, and Mr Arnold felt that it might be a 'retrograde step' for the school to take. The Education Department argued that teachers colleges needed to have a RTS associated with them for the purpose of training teachers to work in rural areas with small schools. The benefits were that the small numbers in the class gave greater opportunity for individual tuition, self-reliance was fostered among the students, and the 'family' grouping developed desirable social attitudes. The class functioned at Hartwell until the end of 1969.

The first full-time librarian, Mr Brian Thompson, was appointed to the school in 1961. Many former students remember him as an inspiring teacher. He compiled a book of children's poetry, including work by Hartwell students, entitled 'Once Around the Sun'. It was published by Oxford University Press, and was dedicated to the children of Hartwell. More of the children's poetry was used in an anthology

compiled by Mr Richard Lewis. This book was called 'Miracles', and was published by UNESCO.

The population of the school dropped steadily in the early 1960's, and in 1966 was down to 392. In 1966 the original cloakroom was converted to a canteen, and mothers began preparing lunches for sale on Mondays. Meat pies, lamingtons and 'Sunnyboy' drinks were popular.

The present school badge was designed by Stokes (Australia) Ltd. in 1966, at the request of the then Head Teacher, Mr A.G. Richards. The original design was 1 1/8 inches wide by 1 3/8 inches high. The hart and well were in gold against a background of dark blue. The letters, leaves and scrolls were in gold against backgrounds of light blue in the upper surround, and light brown in the lower surround. There was no motto at this stage.

In 1968, a parent and member of the school committee, Mr Kenneth Clarke, began production of an annual school magazine called 'The Hartwellian'. This featured students' work and recorded many school happenings. Production ceased after the 1972 'Golden Jubilee' edition.

A TV room was established at the school in 1968, for the watching of educational programs, including the moon

walk. In the same year the ancient red gum tree in the playground was struck by lightning during a severe storm, and some branches were lost.

Leigh Clarnette (student from 1966-68) remembers a pigeon plague at the school. Bird dung was everywhere, on rooves and in the playground. When the plague was at its height, droppings would often fall on students heads while they were having lunch. Men came to poison the birds and also greased the gutters and rooves so that the birds fell to the ground when they died. This upset the children so much that they staged a small demonstration.

After four very successful years as Infant Mistress (1st Class) at Newport Primary School, I transferred to Hartwell in May, 1960 to cut out the long drive each day. Hartwell was only 10 minutes drive from my home in Kew.

The Head Teacher, Mr Arnold, showed me to my office! A little old table with an equally old chair in the back corner of the Infant Cloak Room - smelly wet coats, concrete floor, etc. I took one look and said, 'I will teach in Grade 2'. Fortunately, the Infant Staff, three young and two older women, were very capable, and my being tied to a grade was not such a

drawback. The Infant Staff were Miss Jordan, Miss Jones, Miss Riessen, myself and two other ladies.

My 4 1/2 years teaching Grade 2 children at Hartwell were delightful - lovely children and parents who really cared about their children's progress. It is a long time ago, but I still remember some of the children's names - Jill Short, Peter Jones, Michael McCloskey, Greg and Ann Marie Sparkman, and Andrew Kelso are a few of them.

Mrs McCloskey was the President of the Mothers' Club, and I will always remember their kindness when my mother died. The librarian was Brian Thompson, a very gifted young man. After Mr Arnold retired, a new Head Teacher was appointed. I cannot remember his name - he was a keen gardener.

At the end of the school year in 1965, I said 'good bye' to all my friends at Hartwell as I had received a promotion to the Special Class and would move elsewhere at the beginning of 1966. I still look back with fondness on my happy years at Hartwell Primary School.

## 21. A Magic Carpet Summer - *Brian Thompson MBE*

Last Christmas I drove to Hartwell School for the first time in over thirty years. The school was closed for the holidays and, of course, the gates were locked. The main school building was much as I remembered, but the playgrounds and the additional buildings had changed. A brick building stood where the library and the craft rooms once were.

The old library had started as a one-teacher school somewhere in the Mallee. The school closed and the school house itself was carted down to Melbourne on the back of a lorry and rebuilt in the playground at Hartwell. Each of the four sides of the hut had been designed to open. The walls were really panels that could slide behind each other. In the summer days in the Mallee we presumed that the school had opened itself to the breezes and the class had worked under the roof, but at Hartwell the walls were securely fixed in place. Their sliding days were done.

I have such very happy memories of the five years I taught at Hartwell - all those memorable people - the staff and, above all, the children and their parents. We had so many families who were keen supporters of the school. There was always a sense in which all the work that we did with the children was valued and recognised by the school community.

I worked closely with Norman Camm who was the art teacher and who had a hut similar to mine next door. Norman was a remarkably original teacher. His ideas for projects for the

children were inspirational. He scouted the back lanes of Melbourne for recyclable materials long before the world went green, and he had the children mine clay in their own back gardens. The children in his classes made squat hippos and fat polar bears which he fired in a sawdust kiln. One particularly dreary Melbourne winter when the sky had been a grey ceiling over Hartwell for weeks on end, Norman brought along huge bedsheets and had the oldest children in the school fingerpaint on each a dazzling sun in a light blue sky. These joyful canvases he suspended horizontally from the ceilings of the classrooms to bring a kind of magic carpet summer to the winter days. I've seen hundreds of art teachers at work since those days, but nobody has had the sheer originality and witty ingenuity of Norman Camm.

Most of my work consisted of taking each class in the school for a library lesson and a literature lesson each week. It was always enjoyable and the children were great. We wrote fan letters to favourite authors and, in those innocent days before word processors and the famous author's ability to respond to a young literary admirer with letter 47(b), we were thrilled when authors, many of them very distinguished, wrote kindly and courteous responses. The late Rosemary Sutcliffe, then the leading historical novelist for older children, wrote a lengthy and charming letter to the Hartwell children.

Above all, it is the poetry and writing of the children that I remember with the greatest of pleasure. Hartwell children

gained a reputation for literary excellence as their work was featured in newspaper articles. News of their writing spread through visiting lecturers and students in teacher training colleges. It led to my being commissioned to produce an anthology of verse by Australian children, *Once around the sun*, for Frank Eyre, an authority on children's literature and then editor of Oxford University Press in Melbourne. A very considerable proportion of the book consisted of work by children from Hartwell, and the book was dedicated to the Hartwell children. Judith Wright wrote a generous and enthusiastic introduction to it, praising the work of the young poets. It was in print for many years and was an influential anthology.

There were many wonderful writers among the children. We had an embarrassment of riches. Year after year boys and girls produced personal writing that was honest, stylish and memorable. There were children such as Pam Brewster, John Horne, Peter Milosovek, Michael Smith, Eve Recht and Ann McKenzie who wrote verse that was recognisably their own.

Peter Kelso was the most extraordinary of the young writers. He was a quiet, thoughtful young man with a remarkable seriousness about poetry and writing. An article in 'The Australian' on April 7th, 1965 declared him to be 'Peter the Poetry Prodigy', and the accompanying photograph showed Peter reading poems to his brothers Andrew, John and Timothy. Peter wrote wonderful poems. People still ask me about him thirty five years on. His brother Andrew, also a

gifted and winning young man, was tragically killed in a climbing accident when he was an undergraduate.

Peter wrote a play *Ravens among roses* in Shakespearean verse. Eve Recht's younger brother David wrote incidental music for it. The children designed simple screen sets and the play was performed three times at Hartwell and once at Burwood Teachers' College. This event made the front page of the Melbourne 'Age'. I still have the book containing Peter's text, David's music, and photographs and paintings by the children who saw the play.

Some of the children wrote enough poems to put together a book of their own. Norman Camm helped them make prints, linocuts and simple etchings with which to illustrate their poems.

We made some lovely books on single themes. *The voyage of the river* followed a stream from source to mouth. *The mark of the tides* was a book of sea poems. Our great success was a book called *The voyage of the sun*, a sequence of haiku following the course of a day. This was illustrated with paintings by the children. The children did so many paintings that there was enough left over for a second volume, and this second-best version I have still. The original went off to UNESCO, it was made into slides and shown all over the world.

We had been in touch with Richard Lewis, a teacher and writer from New York, who was travelling around the world collecting children's writing for an anthology to be published by UNESCO. Richard Lewis visited Hartwell and was hugely impressed with the children's work. His selections of writing by

the world's young poets was published under the title *Miracles*, and the Hartwell children were singly the most well represented group from any country in the world in the collection.

So the writings of the children at Hartwell in the early sixties became known world-wide. On the shelf in my study in London I still have a collection of a dozen or so hand-made Hartwell poetry books.

I left Hartwell and Australia at the end of 1965. I was surprised and touched that the Hartwell PTA gave me a typically original and generous gift of vouchers for the Royal Opera House at Covent Garden; and so my final farewell from Hartwell was an unforgettable evening at Covent Garden attending Franco Zeffirelli's starry production of Richard Strauss' *Der Rosenkavalier*.

## 22. An Even More Special Place - *Eve Recht*

Memories of primary school? All sorts of things come to mind, some of which I regularly recall to tell my kids (boy, were things different then ...), and other thoughts are more recent, induced at least in part by this very exercise of writing for a 75th anniversary book.

We were part of the times, which meant that we always wore skirts, even in the middle of winter. I suppose the boys always wore short pants, but I don't really remember. I do remember desperately wanting one of those tartan skirts on a white cotton bodice, but alas I never got one.

There was no bread baked on Sundays and thus no fresh bread on Mondays. So the Mothers' club used to prepare fresh rolls on Monday mornings. Peanut butter or Vegemite and cheese (Kraft, finely grated). I don't remember where the preparation was done, but I do remember the sense of excitement when the rolls were delivered, and I remember proudly carrying a full mixmaster bowl to school when it was my mother's turn to beat the butter with a bit of milk to soften it in those pre-margarine days.

In Grade 5 we became part of the morning tea brigade. We set out the teaspoons and the sugar bowls in both staffrooms. There were separate men's and women's staffrooms, although I suspect one was the Ladies', not the Women's. And the men certainly had a smaller one – tucked away up the back upstairs.

I think that's where the banking was done too. It's certainly where we had RI (and yes, it was Religious Instruction, not Religious Education), when we had it. There weren't many of us Jewish children, and there wasn't always someone to 'take' us. So we spent a lot of time in the library, which suited me just fine, especially after Mr Thompson came and the library became an even more special place.

All of us in those years were very lucky, very privileged and very special. I think we knew it at the time but I don't think we realised just how special and how far ahead of his time Brian Thompson was. We revelled in writing poetry and listening to a wide range of classical music. I especially remember the *Moldau*, with some artwork on the board to help us imagine the river. And for me there was an extra thrill in that piece because the main theme sounded like the Hatikvah, the Israeli national anthem.

It wasn't just Mr Thompson. There was also Mr Camm and Mr Chalmers – putting desks together for group work in the classroom, creating our own books in the art room, ideas that today are completely taken for granted.

I remember lots of sitting in rows as well, copying the day's writing pattern or a diagram showing the structure of flowers. I still don't know which part of the flower is the stamen, or the names of all the kings of England (we were still

very British), but I still write (even if not poetry) and I still value the learning and using of knowledge.

Of course, I learnt my tables and plenty of grammar. And I know that to divide fractions, you invert and multiply. I dutifully learnt that rule, among many others, but it wasn't until I became a teacher in the seventies that I understood how and why the rule works.

I think those years were the beginning of a new way of teaching children, of relating to children, and we at Hartwell were particularly fortunate. And I was doubly fortunate – where I lived as well as the school I went to. We were one of only two or three non-Anglo families ('new Australians' we were called then) and I knew I was different but felt okay with that difference.

I now know that ours was a solid middle-class suburb, very staid and homogenous but to me and my family it was mostly safe and secure. My parents had come here as refugees after the war and had actually spent their first night in Australia in the house in Oberwyl Road which they eventually bought.

The neighbourhood was certainly Anglo-centric. We had a family story about my older brother Alex when he was

about three. He was out in the street on his tricycle and had wandered a few houses up to play with Susie the dog. He spoke only Yiddish at the time, so when my mother called out to him – in Yiddish – that it was time to come in for tea, he just pedalled away home. The neighbour, however, was astonished: 'He can understand you when you talk like that!!?'

I'm glad I was part of that family and that street. We were a bit unusual but we belonged and we thrived. They were different times then, when assimilation was the policy, not multiculturalism, but as I grew up things were starting to change.

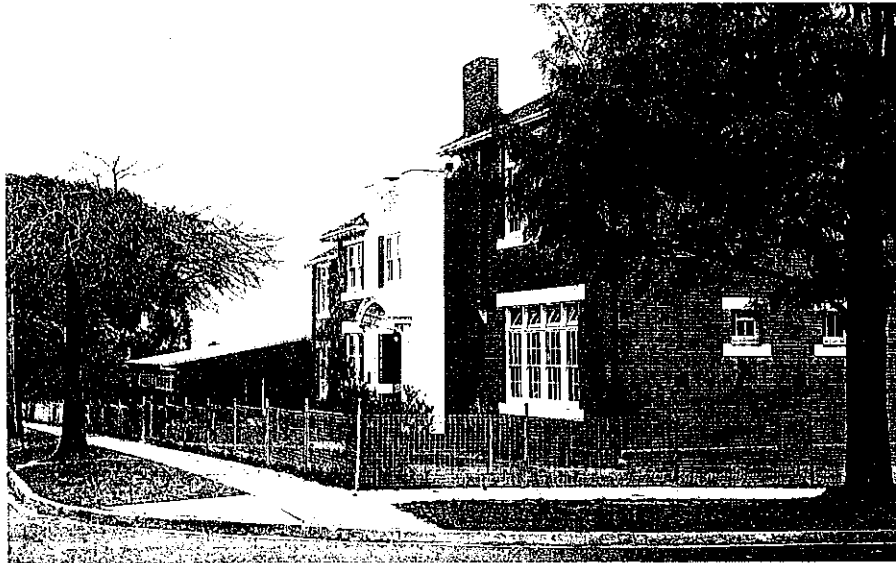


41. Grade 5-6B 1963. Eve is fourth from right, second row.

The winds of change were certainly blowing in the classrooms and playgrounds of our school. I feel very lucky, very grateful (even like the cat who's got the cream) to have been a child in those times and in that place.

So as I write this thirty odd years later, looking out on my green and peaceful garden, with its many textures and patterns, I feel very connected to the lush green garden of my childhood.

### 23. 1970's: A Time for Building

In 1970 there were moratoriums against the war in Vietnam, and the Pope visited Australia. In 1971 Neville Bonner became the first Aboriginal person to be elected to Australian Parliament. In 1972 Gough Whitlam became Prime Minister, and Australian troops came home from Vietnam. In 1973 the Sydney Opera House was opened, and in 1974 Cyclone Tracy destroyed much of Darwin. Colour TV was introduced in 1975, and in 1977 refugee boats from Vietnam started arriving in Darwin.

At Hartwell State School numbers rose again to 472 in 1976, before dropping back to below 400 in 1980. An article in the 'Free Press', 16th December, 1972, reported that classes at Hartwell averaged 30-31 pupils, and that the school was 'blessed with an enthusiastic, hard-working mothers' club'. The reporter discussed the issue of migrant children in schools with the Headmaster, Mr Campbell. He is quoted as saying:

*'We have a cross-section of migrant children here including children from Zambia, Indonesia, Japan, and Malaya as well as from Greece, Italy and other European countries. They are rather taking children and as we have relatively few of them they disappear among the others. They learn very quickly - they have to. We appreciate their presence.'*

Mr Campbell also said he was on the watch for children with problems:

*'Children are under greater stress now than in the past. Unsupervised TV viewing of unsuitable films and frequent domestic conflict cause strain and personal problems.'*

However, he was delighted with the use the children were making of the new library:

*'It is not unusual for me to walk in there during lunchtime and find 50 or so sitting on the carpet reading books.'*

The new purpose-built Library was built in 1970, and the Art/ Craft Room followed in early 1973. Both of these were funded by the 'Hartwell State School Co-operative Ltd.' under the leadership of School Committee President, Kenneth Clarke. The Multi-Purpose Room was formed by joining the two separate wooden classrooms that had been placed at the school (from other schools) in 1930.

The original school motto having apparently been forgotten, the School Committee and Principal decided to adopt a new motto in 1970. Pupils were invited to suggest ideas, and, after consideration, the motto 'Strive for the Highest' was chosen. This was a modification of the suggestion by Stacey Karambolas of Grade 4A. The motto was incorporated into the school badge.

The school celebrated its Golden Jubilee (50th birthday) on the 14th April, 1972. Miss Eleanor Foster (then 89) and one of her former pupils, Senator Ivor Greenwood, attended the celebration.

School teams competed in interschool sports: cricket and football for boys; basketball, rounders and softball for

girls. The girls wore red gingham tunics for interschool sport, the boys wore white shorts and top for cricket, shorts and striped jumper for football. Swimming classes were held at Camberwell Pool, and some children participated in the District Swimming Sports. Hartwell was also represented in the annual Glen Iris and District athletic sports. Folk dancing was performed in the quadrangle for visitors on Education Day.

In 1979 some of the Grade 4 children, with the encouragement of their teacher Mrs Mary Jensen, made contact with Hartwell School in England as part of their social studies program. They exchanged correspondence and photographs, and in so doing compared lifestyles.

Hartwell State School received its first female principal in 1976, Mrs Elizabeth Somerwell. The playing of the drum at Monday morning assembly stopped at this time. Mrs Dorothy Fargher, President of the Mothers' Club and member of School Council, remembers that some Grade 5 boys had alternative words for the National Anthem:

*'God save our biscuit tin*

*Don't let the ants get in...'*

She also recalls another fate for naughty boys - they were put in the Headmaster's cupboard!

## 24. Mobilising Resources - *Kenneth Clarke*

The thirteen year period, 1967-1979, covers the time when my three children attended Hartwell Primary School.

**1967**

At the first parents' meeting in 1967, I volunteered to join the committee and was invited to do so a few months later, probably about May. I had had no previous experience of school committees, so I was prepared to listen and learn. But I couldn't work out why so little happened, until I realised that we had a Headmaster who had been appointed to Hartwell for one year only, and we had a Chairman of Committee whose children had long since left the school, but who had been re-elected Chairman for maybe 20 years. In short, there was not a sufficiently deep interest in developing the school.

My philosophy was that there was no reason why State Schools could not have many of the advantages that the private schools enjoyed, it was just a question of setting goals and mobilising the available resources to achieve them. All the parents were interested in the best for their children, and there was a wealth of diverse talent amongst the parent body.

This year Ron Callahan and I pushed for the introduction of television to the school. It was incredible how much debate there was in spending, I think, \$70 (which, to be sure, was not a trifling sum at that time). There seemed to be a dominant attitude in committee that one could not or should

not afford to spend, that we always had to be careful. But there were good educational programmes on TV which we felt could benefit the children. The TV was purchased and installed.

The same year I persuaded the Headmaster, teachers and Committee to let me launch a published magazine. I had been editor/publisher of a scientific journal for some years so I was not without experience. Mrs Murray, the English teacher, was most enthusiastic and she acted as co-ordinator at the school. We discussed representative content from each level at the school, and the result was 'The Hartwellian', Issue no. 1. During discussion about the magazine, information arose from somebody with a long memory about a badge that had been designed for the school in 1966, so this was incorporated.

During this year I launched the idea of an architect-designed library to cost \$15,000. This, as you can imagine, generated a lot of discussion - can we possibly afford it? why should not the Education Department provide these facilities? and so on. My argument was that if we waited for the Department to provide these amenities, our children would have long since left the school before they were provided.

At this time, the library was a portable classroom 20' by 30' situated off the north-west corner of the main school

building. The Art/ Craft room was another portable 20' by 30' situated a little north of this.

Since the new library would become an integral part of the school, it was not possible to raise a mortgage on the building since it could not be repossessed in the event of repayment default. It was necessary to set up a company with the \$15,000 underwritten by parents, and I managed to persuade enough parents to have faith in the ability of the School Committee working with the school community to raise the funds needed to meet the repayments on time. I expressed the confidence of the Committee that not one cent of the underwritten amount would be called in, and I showed my confidence by underwriting \$1000 personally. The repayments were to be made over a 10 year period and we were obliged by law to follow certain company procedures. I was elected Chairman of the company, and I promised to stay involved until the last repayment was made.

We raised money by annual school fetes and progressive dinners. We held lecture nights on topical subjects (eg. UFO's and space travel). We asked parents to save their newspapers and bring bundles to the school shelter shed on appropriate Saturday mornings about every six weeks and APM collected the load (about 4-5 tons) on the following Monday. Parents saved egg cartons and dropped them in a collection box at the school. These were bundled up and sold to an egg merchant who paid about \$2 per hundred.

1970 saw the old shelter shed on the west side of the main school building demolished, and the new library

completed. Also that year we added a school motto to the badge: 'Strive for the Highest'.

#### 1971

This year we introduced names to the school Houses: Batman, Burke, Flinders and Mawson, rather than just calling them Red, Blue, Green and Gold.

#### 1972

This was Golden Jubilee year and we organised a special celebration on Golden Jubilee Day, 14th April, 1972. Our special guests were Senator Ivor Greenwood, a former pupil of Hartwell Primary School, and Miss Eleanor Foster who was a teacher at Hartwell for 31 years from 15th July, 1925 to 1st July, 1956.

The new architect designed Art/ Craft room was started, to cost \$15,000. It required the establishment of a second company to underwrite the cost. This took a lot more persuasion because we were only two years in to paying off the library debt. Again the \$15,000 had to be underwritten by the parents, and the fact that it was showed their confidence. This required a ten year repayment period 1972-1982. Again I was appointed Chairman of the company, and again I promised to stay involved until the last repayment was made, as some sort of assurance that not one cent of the underwritten pledges would be called in.

To build the Art/ Craft room we asked the Education Department for permission to demolish the original library (the 20' by 30' portable). This was refused so we asked permission to move it and join it to the original Art/ Craft room (the other

portable), to create a 30' by 40' Multi-Purpose Room. This was granted. The new Art/ Craft room was completed in early 1973.

Also in 1972 we introduced ribbons with the Hartwell crest for the school athletic sports: 1st red, 2nd blue, 3rd green. After this year, John Francis, a parent of the school, took over the magazine and created his own folio style presentation.

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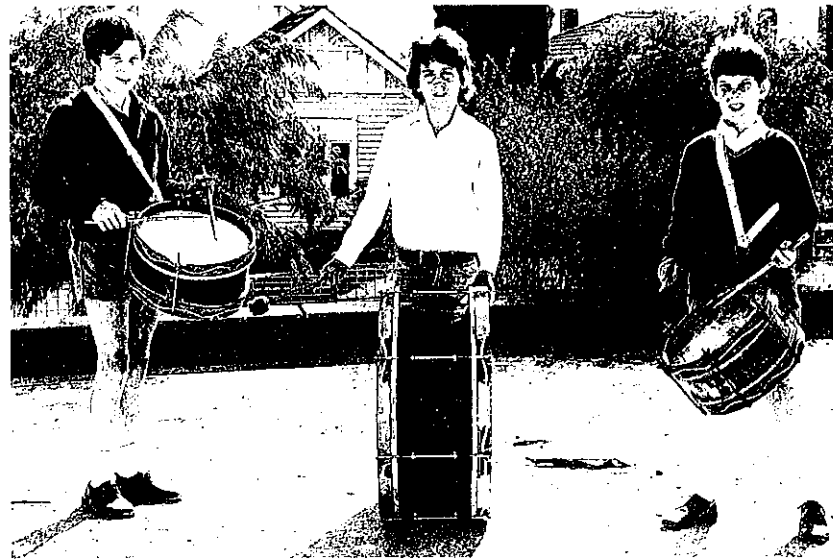
Sometime during the period 1970-73 inclusive regular working bees were organised for maintenance of the school grounds. Rather than have one big working bee once a term, as had been the practise, parents were asked to nominate which half-day was most convenient for each to help, Saturday or Sunday, morning or afternoon. Eight teams were established under team leaders so that each team worked only one half day weekend per term. In this way, with small teams, we could keep the grounds well maintained. We planted about 150 or more native shrubs. The thought behind this effort was that the

children unconsciously absorb the ambience of a good environment by spending their days in one.

In 1980 the final library repayment was made and the underwritings were discharged. About 1981 (with two years to run on the Art/ Craft room repayments), the School Committee of the day contacted me with a view to taking over the Art/ Craft room debt so that they could use the existing company structure to borrow funds for the building of the little amphitheatre on the west side of the main building. This was done, and the original underwritings were discharged.

*The achievements under Kenneth Clarke's leadership of the School Committee were significant, and those of us who*

*have come after him can be very grateful for the effort that he and other parents put in at this time. They showed that they 'truly believe that children are the world's most valuable resource and their education worth our best effort'. ('The Hartwellian', page 5, Issue no. 5, Nov.1972)*

## 25. 1980's: Changing Principals

A former Hollywood actor, Ronald Reagan, was elected President of the United States in 1980. In 1983 the yacht 'Australia II' won the America's Cup, and Uluru (Ayers Rock) was returned to the Aboriginal people by the Commonwealth Government. The world's first frozen embryo baby was born in Melbourne in 1984, and in 1986 the world's worst nuclear disaster took place at Chernobyl in the USSR. In 1987 the AIDS epidemic affected thousands of people, and in 1989 an international treaty was formulated to protect the ozone layer and combat the 'greenhouse effect'. The 1980's also saw personal computers appearing in homes and schools as well as offices.

Hartwell Primary School moved into this decade with Gordon Chancellor as Principal, followed by Jack Silva in 1982, who continued the interest in the school garden by encouraging the children to be involved in its care. Beryl Blackwood followed in 1984. She was at the school for about a year before taking extended sick leave, and Phil Quinlan moved in as Acting Principal. As another principal could not be appointed until Beryl Blackwood officially resigned, Mr Quinlan continued in this position until the end of 1988. David Ross was appointed Principal in 1989 and led the school into the 1990's.

Ann Kiewiet, President of the School Council from 1982-85, remembers that the Mothers' Club was disbanded in about 1983. The Mothers' Club had traditionally been

responsible for fundraising, while the School Committee or Council (as it became in the 1970's) took care of maintenance and business matters. With more mothers busy in the paid workforce, it was felt that fundraising may be more efficiently taken care of under the umbrella of School Council, and the majority of parents agreed. Fetes continued to be a successful way of fundraising, and Trivia Nights also became popular in these years. A new Parents' Association was formed in the late 80's to act as a communication channel between school and parents.

The number of students at Hartwell dropped in the 1980's to around the 370 mark. Volunteer mothers (and the occasional father) ran the canteen on Mondays, helped in

classrooms with reading, in the Library and Art Room, with PMP (Perceptual Motor Program) for Preps and Grade 1's, and in other ways such as assisting with class excursions. Parents continued to assist with weekend working bees.

Laurel Kinross (Rayner), a teacher from 1978-88, remembers Hartwell as a pleasant middle class area where, in many families, both parents were involved in careers. After the Ash Wednesday bushfires of 1983, teachers and children combined in an effort to provide clothes, toys and food for the many fire victims. Only days before this a massive dust storm had rolled across the Melbourne suburbs, suddenly turning the hot summer day to a murky twilight. Fortunately, Jack Silva saw it coming and shouted instructions to the teachers as they 'battened down the hatches' and calmed the frightened children.

Swimming classes at the new indoor Box Hill Pool commenced for some grades, and senior children continued to participate in inter-school sport. A camping program for the older children also developed. Musical education depended on the enthusiasm and skills of individual class teachers, there being no specialist music teacher. All grades had Italian language classes.

A brick landscaped barbecue area was added to the school grounds near the Multi-Purpose Room and became a popular spot for class functions as well as adding diversity to the playground area.

The After School Program, designed to care for children after school hours until 6pm if both parents were at

work, started in the late 1980's. Initially it struggled to survive with few children enrolled, and it was held in conjunction with St. Dominic's School, those children walking down Highfield Road to Hartwell after school finished for the day. Children whose parents were at home were encouraged to attend also and participate in crafts and activities in order to boost numbers and make the program viable.

The school uniform started to change in the late 1980's from the standard grey shorts, grey shirt and grey school jumper (for boys) and blue gingham dress (for girls) to include navy shorts and trackpants, navy badged windcheaters, and light blue T-shirts with red printed badge. Uniform was not compulsory but was encouraged.

Early in 1989, many parents expressed opinions about the traditional declaration said by students in Monday morning assemblies:

*I love God and my country*

*I honour the flag*

*I will serve the Queen*

*And cheerfully obey*

*My parents, teachers and the law.*

This was the same declaration that had been said since the school was opened in 1922. It was felt that the wording held little meaning for the children. Under Ministry of Education guidelines, the children from Prep to Grade 6 wrote individual pledges, and from these a composite pledge was formed by a committee of students and teachers:

*I am proud of my country Australia*

*I value peace and freedom*

*I will protect the environment*

*and try to keep our school and community*

*a friendly, co-operative and caring place.*

This pledge was trialled for a year at the request of School Council before being permanently adopted after Council again sought parental opinion. The pledge is said at every Monday morning assembly before the singing of 'Advance Australia Fair'.

Perhaps some of the atmosphere of the school in these years can be summed up by Laurel Kinross:

*'This school broke down my unrealistic dreams, brought much laughter and fun into my working day, and provided me with some life-long friends, both parents and teachers. It provided me with a wealth of memories about some super kids who I'd love to see again.'*

## 26. 1990's: A School of the Future

The 1990's have been called the information age. Advances in computer technology and worldwide communications have progressed rapidly. Teachers often admit that their students know more than they do about computers; we have come a long way from the days of slates. At Hartwell Primary School every classroom has at least one computer for the students' use.

The grounds and buildings of the school have also changed this decade. A new toilet block has been built adjoining the school, and the old 'primitive' boys' and girls' toilet blocks remembered by ex-students have been demolished. The upper oval adjacent to Milverton Street has been grassed. New playground equipment has been installed in the Prep area. The old girls' shelter shed has been demolished and a block of three new weatherboard classrooms put in its place; recently these have been linked to the main school building with a covered walkway. The downstairs classrooms of the original school have been converted into a new administration area, offices, and staff room. The school has been painted and refitted inside and out and had new carpet laid. This year a new Physical Education Centre/ Music Room/ Canteen complex is to be built. The old Multi-Purpose Room will be demolished on completion of the new centre.

Hartwell Primary School has become a 'School of the Future' along government guidelines, a system

allowing school self-management. Enrolment is currently at 370 students who enjoy a variety of experiences in their primary school years.

The school believes that students at primary school level should be encouraged to participate and contribute to many decisions made within the school, leading to shared responsibility and the establishment of a strong loyalty on the part of students for their school and its beliefs. The Student Representative Council (SRC) allows this participation. The SRC is comprised of representatives from years 4-6, elected by the children in those grades. Weekly meetings are held, and

representatives report back to all classes. Liaison between the SRC and other committees operating within the school is encouraged. The SRC often co-ordinates support for charities, such as other schools affected by fire or floods, a 'Dolphin in the Bay', the State Schools' Relief Committee, and a sponsored child, Tamanech Major, in Ethiopia.

Camps are a popular part of school life in the 1990's,

and Hartwell has a well organised program beginning with the Year 2 'sleep-in' at school. Years 3-6 each go on an annual camp, the camps increasing in length as the children get older. Year 6 travels to Canberra for a week to study the workings of Parliament and view other places of interest. Educational excursions are also organised throughout the year for all year levels.

The Student Code of Conduct and Welfare Policy emphasizes the need for co-operation between students, teachers and parents. The Code of Conduct sets out childrens' rights and responsibilities, and a set of rules and consequences for inappropriate behaviour. Inappropriate behaviour is dealt with by discussion, 'Time Out', or removal of priveleges. Parents will be contacted if the behaviour continues. Appropriate behaviour is positively reinforced. The days of corporal punishment - strap, cane or ruler, are long gone.

School uniform is not compulsory, but encouraged. Both boys and girls wear navy shorts or track pants, light blue T-shirts or polo shirts with a red printed emblem, and navy rugby tops, jackets or hooded windcheaters with a white printed emblem. Girls can also wear a checked blue/white/red dress in summer or a navy skirt in winter.

PMP (Perceptual Motor Program) is run, with the help of parents, for Preps and Year 1's. Inter-school sport operates for Year 5 and 6 children through summer and winter. Sports include softball, rounders, cricket, football, soccer, newcombe, and T-ball. Children from Year 3 up can also participate in the District Athletics Sports, District Cross Country, and the District

Swimming Sports. Each year classes at each level attend swimming lessons at Whitehorse Swimming and Recreation Centre.

Tournament of Minds provides the opportunity for teams of students to participate in creative problem solving. Each team consists of 7 members. They choose a long-term problem to solve from the areas of Maths/ Engineering, Language/ Literature and Social Sciences. The team presents its solution on Tournament Day, as well as attempting to solve a short-term or spontaneous problem. State Finals are held at Monash University in September each year.

The BHP Challenge is a quiz series for Grade 6 students from state and independent primary schools in the eastern suburbs. Each team consists of three students who 'do battle' with other schools through a series of heats. The Grand Final is held at Camberwell Civic Centre in June. Hartwell students have competed successfully in this competition, also in the Maths and Science Talent Quests, which are open to students in year levels 1-12. Students can enter individually, in groups, or as a class. Students and teachers choose their own project idea. Entries may be presented as a written report, model, film, video or audio tape, or as a game.

All year levels learn Italian as their Language Other Than English (LOTE). They participate in music lessons each week, with recorder, choir, and drums being offered for higher grades.

The After and Before School Program no longer struggles to survive, and now functions independently of St Dominic's. It is restricted to children whose parents work or study away from home. A holiday program also operates.

Parent participation in the school is encouraged in a number of ways: through School Council and sub-committees; help with PMP; in staffing the Canteen on Mondays; in the school uniform shop; on excursions and special class activities; with weekend working bees; through FAMP (Family Maths Program); in fetes and fundraising; helping in the Library and office, and so on. Hartwell Primary School is a busy place!

## 27. Striving for the Highest - *David Ross*

As we turn to the '90's, the first Local Selection of a Principal for Hartwell from 1989 gave an opportunity for consistent long term planning in the development of the curriculum, the buildings and the grounds.

A master plan was quickly developed and representations made with regard to major maintenance of buildings and grounds and the completion of the Master Plan.

The School Council under the leadership of Roger Powell had made the movement of the student toilets to the main building from separate structures quite some distance away a high priority. This came to fruition in 1989 through a major works project. A relandscaped grass area for major games was also undertaken with local funds through a Building Cooperative.

These were quickly followed by an Administration/Staffroom Upgrade during 1990, again as a major works project, which resulted in the two front classrooms (old Rooms 1 & 2) and Room 3 being converted to offices and staffroom. Three new classrooms were thus required and following negotiation with Region, a wing from the closed Meglin P.S. in Eltham was relocated to the site of the old shelter sheds.

Mr Harry May retired as school cleaner in 1990 and the old caretaker's house became part of the school following the transfer from the Ministry of Housing to the Department of

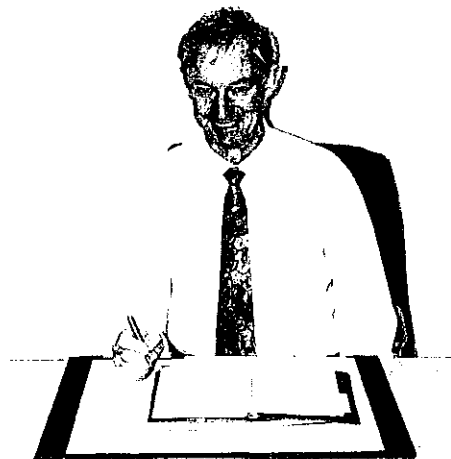

Education. It was subsequently demolished and the land used for a senior adventure playground.

As the Department had a policy of non-replacement of shelter sheds, using local funds a new solid brick building was erected at the end of 1992 on the western boundary. This comprised a rebound wall, a storage/meeting room and a garage for gardening equipment.

The replacement of the Multi-Purpose Room was also a major priority during this period with a regional listing being achieved at the end of 1991 in conjunction with the Master Plan.

Times change and automatic eligibility no longer applied from 1992 as an ongoing enrolment of 450 students became necessary. Nevertheless, in 1993 we won the Colgate Cup for the best performing Primary School at the State Track and Field Championships, so in the development of the School Charter for the period 1994-1997, one of the priorities was to



enhance the provision of a range of school programs including Physical Education, Personal Development and the Performing Arts (music, drama and dance).

In February 1997, School Council decided to proceed with the erection of the new centre - P.E. hall, music room and canteen complex- using considerable local funds. Scheduled for completion in November/ December, this will be a fitting culmination to the 75th Anniversary year.

Major maintenance has been an ongoing concern and the School Council began using a combination of parent

volunteer labour and expertise and contracts to endeavour to catch up on the backlog.

The outside of the main building was repainted in heritage colours during 1994-95. The six upstairs classrooms were repainted and recarpeted in June 1994 with Phillip Jordan providing leadership by example, with the Library and three downstairs classrooms completed in September 1995.

In addition, through enthusiastic parent initiatives coordinated by Dalene Constable, the Multi-Purpose Room was repainted, recarpeted and the kitchen area modernised. The Out of Hours Programs were most appreciative.

Then in March 1996, the long awaited Major Maintenance grant was announced. \$217,000 has been used to complete the refurbishment of the remaining five classrooms, the music room, the corridors and small meeting rooms and the roofs of the main building and the five infant rooms. What we see in May, 1997 is a delight to the eye and a fitting tribute to all those who have given so much time and effort to the development and maintenance of the school over the last seventy five years.

In looking at the curriculum, 'Strive for the Highest' is just as appropriate today as in the years gone by. The strong tradition of excellence in basic literacy and numeracy has

continued with ongoing support from the parent community and strident demands from private industry for literate employees.

Daily table recitation is no longer the norm at 10.25am, but automatic response is still an integral part of the mathematics program. Mathematical concepts and reasoning are important in seeking solutions to practical problems related to real life.

Such initiatives as the 'Literature Club' for senior students give emphasis to the reading program, whether it be for pleasure or for a particular task. The example of parents enjoying reading is as powerful today as in 1922. With the current avalanche of technology, a good book, however, will always have its place.

During the past ten years, the 'whole language' approach has widened the horizons for all students with word attack skills such as phonics still a necessary part of learning to read.

Having affirmed the basics, emphases on the cultural aspects of the curriculum is most appropriate to students living in Camberwell and in such proximity to the Victorian Arts Centre. Accordingly, the Art/Craft program is extensive and incorporates an Art Appreciation course for students in Years 4-6 in conjunction with the National Gallery of Victoria. In 1990 with a student enrolment of 409, a Music specialist began an expanding program. By the mid-'90s all students have an hours tuition per week with also school choirs, a drum band

and recorder consort giving wider scope for students with talent and interest.

Also in 1990, the appointment of a further full-time specialist for the Physical Education program widened the scope and led to exemplary standards of achievements. As well as winning the district championships on a number of

occasions, the state championship was achieved in 1993. The Perceptual Motor Program (P.M.P.) has continued to be a vital part of the first two years at school. As always, participation and seeking personal bests is the aim. Teamwork is the highest priority and being humble winners and gracious losers worthy attitudes.

The appointment of Mrs Elaine Jago as Assistant Principal in 1990 greatly enhanced the leadership team. With a strong background in curriculum and in particular, literature, strong oversight has continued and the Reading Recovery program for students in Year 1 was introduced in 1995.

As an expression of the interest and expertise of students, the state Mathematics Talent Quest, the Science Quest, the Tournament of the Minds and the BHP Academic Challenge have all provided opportunities to present at a wider forum. It has been most pleasing to find statewide awards on a number of occasions which reinforce our view that our students are achieving very fine results indeed. When one pauses to think of past students and their significant achievements and contributions to public life, a very fine tradition continues.

The other major Department of Education initiative is that of 'Classrooms of the Future' which seeks to anticipate the role of technology. Whilst the school has a small computer laboratory, banks of three computers in each classroom are linked to a network with access to the Internet. In addition a computerised central library has its own network and can also access the Internet. Students become computer literate from Prep. class with the key concept of the computer as an almost limitless source of information. Research skills and knowing where to look for reliable information is an essential skill for students of the '90s.

When such areas as a Language Other Than English (LOTE), presently Italian; road safety (Bike Ed.); personal

development (Life Ed.) and now the governments drug initiative, are added, the pressure on the school day is relentless.

In seeking to summarise the thinking of the present, the changed school pledge, written in 1989 covers it well:

*' I am proud of my country, Australia,  
I value peace and freedom,  
I will protect the environment  
And try to keep our school and community  
A friendly, co-operative and caring place.'*
